CARPENTERS IN AGREEMENT

Reach Settlement on Wages to Be Paid in Des Moines. DEMOCRATS WANT CANDIDATES. State Committee Has Difficulty Finding Enough Men to Go on Primary Ballot—Young Mother Loses Child.

DES MOINES, Ia., April 4.—(Special Telegram.)—Carpenters and master builders of Des Moines this evening effected a settlement of a strike which was begun Monday for an increase of wages. Representatives of the two bodies were in conference all afternoon and announced that a new wage schedule had been signed, but both sides refuse to state just what agreement had been entered into. It is believed that some increase of wages was granted. The demand of the carpenters had been for an increase of 90 cents an hour. To for a small body of helpers for the plumbers started a strike, which may affect others in a strike. For some days all building operations had been at a standstill, but it is stated work will be resumed at once. The democratic state committee today made arrangements to fill out the entire democratic ticket and secure candidates to run for office at the primary. The chief difficulty with them is to find men willing to make the race at all and submit their names to the voters. The state committee also made arrangements for a special train to take the Iowa delegation to Baltimore to the national convention and for the use of the sleeping cars while in that city in place of yielding to the high charges of the hotels. Interurban Service Restored. Service was restored today on the interurban lines from Des Moines to Fort Dodge by completion of a temporary bridge at Frazer where a part of the bridge had been washed out by the floods. The Des Moines river has lowered rapidly and all danger is past. Mrs. Mary Compton lies at the Methodist hospital with a babe only a few days old by her side, and today her 3-year-old daughter died as the result of injuries received in a street car accident three days ago. The mother cannot be told of the fate of her oldest child yet.

NEGRO VODOO DOCTOR

Explains His Methods. LAFAYETTE, La., April 2.—Joseph Thibodeaux, the negro "voodoo" doctor from whom Clementine Barnabet, the negress who confessed to murdering seventeen of her race, said she bought "condjur bags," was brought here under arrest late today from New Iberia. Clementine identified Thibodeaux as the person who sold her the "condjur" believed to have the power to shield her from detection. The "voodoo doctor" said he effected cures of illness by the use of roots and herbs and explained his queer plans to restore health. He said one plan was to give the ailing person a piece of paper upon which was written twenty-five letters in five lines. He explained that if the patient tore off one letter, rolled it into a pill and swallowed it every time the patient "felt bad" he would be cured at once of the disease, domestic troubles or anything else. He said a person possessing one of these papers with the written letters would never fall into the hands of his or her enemies. He denied every statement made by Clementine.
