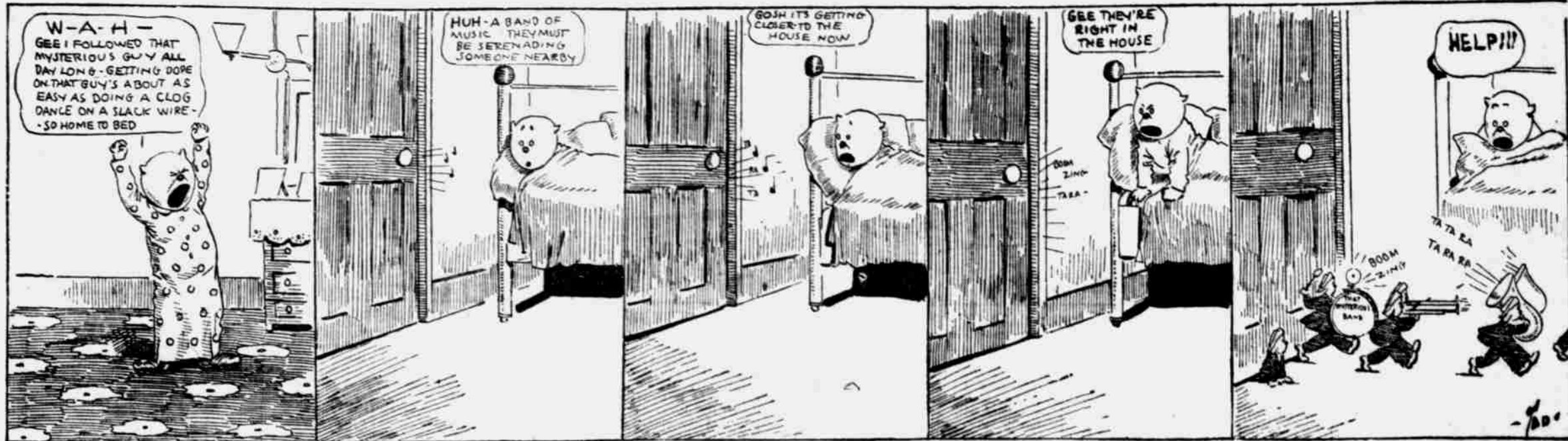

AFFAIRS AT SOUTH OMAHA

Council Holds Up Appointments

Made by Mayor Trainor. BOND MATTER STILL HANGS FIRE

Office of Building Inspector is to Be Created—Council Will Meet Again Saturday—Complaint of Slaughter House.

Councilman Mat Peterson at a special meeting of the council held this morning refused to confirm the reappointment of the members of the Library board...

The members of the Library board are Messrs. W. S. King, W. B. Cheek, Bruce McCulloch and Mesdames Josephine Carroll and L. Sloan. Lew Ester was nominated by the mayor to fill the place of A. P. Durkee...

A communication from Frank C. Yates, banker of Omaha, called the attention of the council to the fact that the \$15,000 renewal bond was still hanging on with Allen Bros. who had agreed to recall the bonds or reject them within a ten-day limit...

Complaint of New Plant. The neighborhood of the residents in K streets against the erection of a slaughter house in that vicinity was referred to the building inspector...

The cost of registration revision amounted to \$210, while the expense for paying election judges and clerks totaled \$23. The bills were ordered paid.

The old matter of the General Contracting company was revived by an order to transfer \$1,250 from the interest and sinking fund to the fund of paving district No. 2...

In allowing the salaries Councilman Mat Peterson read \$50 instead of \$60 for Councilman Walters. Councilman Miller moved that Councilman Peterson should read in the additional \$10 for Councilman Walters. The same was done.

An ordinance creating the office of building inspector and specifying certain fees that are to be attached to the office was introduced by Councilman Frank. The council will meet Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

License is Revoked. Charles Austin, a saloon keeper, charged with the sale of liquor after hours on March 13 at his saloon, Twenty-sixth and O streets, was fined \$100 and costs and had his license revoked this morning in the police court.

Austin defended himself and pleaded for a continuance, offering in support of his plea a summons from the grand jury. Judge Callanan obligingly agreed with that body that the time of Austin's appearance in Omaha might be deferred for a couple of hours until the case had been tried.

Austin was caught by two deputy sheriffs on the night of March 13. It is alleged that he sold beer to the officers of the law. The decision of the court makes it incumbent on the Fire and Police board to revoke the license.

WIFE CHARGES NON-SUPPORT

When Fred Keffer, a sheep butcher at one of the local packing houses, appeared yesterday with Lee Martin, a woman companion, on a charge of vagrancy before Police Judge Callanan, he was confronted by an irate wife, who filed a complaint of non-support against her recreant spouse.

Keffer, according to his wife's statement, has been a derelict for some time. Mrs. Keffer undertook to bring her husband to time, and Tuesday night located him in company with a woman in a house near Twenty-fourth and N streets. She informed the police and the arrest followed.

Chief of Detectives James Slichahan is looking for the thief who was so lost to professional pride as to attempt to rob the Brown Park school Tuesday night. When the chief heard of the attempted robbery he took the matter up himself out of curiosity as to the perpetrator of the crime.

Investigation showed that every room in the school house had been broken into and many of the desks pried open. Ten bunches of keys were taken. It is the opinion of the police the thief was looking for a key to a room in which the tools and supplies belonging to the manual training department were kept.
