

No furnishings of recent origin are to be found in this attractive, old-fashioned bungalow. Only such chests and tables, chairs and stools, hooked rugs and high-four-posted beds with flowered canopies, as were used by the New Englanders of the early eighteenth century, are to be used in this sea-coast dwelling.

The house is a gabled, two-story seven-room structure of dark brown shingles on a cobblestone foundation. The living room, which extends the width of the house, has a big, open, beick fireplace over which will hang the motto which expresses the spirit of the place. The motto is Scotch and written in copper on dark wood. "Ye canna be bath grand and comfortable."

The outdoor dining room has two ex-

posed. On one side are the hills with their forests of stately pines, deep and dark, musical and fragrant. And from the hills trickles the river Agamenticus like a silver ribbon. On the other side is the grand old Atlantic booming against the rugged rocks. A kitchen completes the downstairs and the bedrooms are on the second floor of the bungalow.
