ST. PAUL SCORES IN TENTH
Indianapolis Loses Opening Game After Getting Nice Lead.

TWO RUNS TIE GAME IN NINTH
Seven to Six is the Final Result of Contest Which Mayor Shanks Begins by Tossing Up Potato.

INDIANAPOLIS, April 10.—St. Paul tied the score in the ninth with two runs and won the opening game of the American association season from Indianapolis here today in the tenth inning, when Higgett tripled and came in on Goodman's flyout. The locals pounced Karger for five runs in the second, but Daus, who went in in the third, held Indianapolis scoreless during the rest of the game. The attendance was one of the largest on record for an opening day here. Mayor Shanks, who was scheduled to toss the first ball, pitched up a potato instead.
