Union Services of Episcopal Churches to Hear Rev. H. Percy Silver.

MISSIONARY WORK THE TOPIC

Rev. M. O. McLaughlin of Hartford Church to Tell of Political Experience—Williams on Politics.

Sunday being the octave of the festival of Easter, the splendid music of that occasion will be repeated at Trinity cathedral tomorrow night at a special union service of all the Episcopal churches in the city.

Rev. M. O. McLaughlin, pastor of the Hartford United Brethren church, will tell of the experiences of a minister in a political campaign at the evening service at the church tomorrow.

Rev. Milton B. Williams, pastor of the First Methodist church, will give his views of local politics Sunday morning, preaching a sermon on "The Greatest Obstacle to the Political Redemption of Omaha."

Rev. John Grant Shick, pastor of the McCabe Methodist church, will spend next week touring the state in the interest of the Nebraska Wesleyan university endowment fund campaign, making addresses in the principal cities and towns of the state.
