

BIG MUDDY BOLSTERS AGAIN

County Surveyor Believes Danger at Florence is Now Over.

ESTIMATE IS MADE OF DAMAGE

Red and Gun Club Feels that it Could Have Stood a Heavier Flow Into Carter Lake—Manawa Well Filled.

The "Big Muddy" bolstered up again yesterday and stood at its old mark of Saturday morning of 154 feet. It dropped two or three inches Sunday afternoon, but a fresh volume of water, aided by a high north wind, has given new cause for uneasiness to property owners along the river. The water is choppy and is coming down in a big torrent, making it impossible to get an exact reading of the gauge. The new crest that came is but momentary, however, the water rapidly receding and was again at 15 feet at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

County Surveyor McBride believes all danger is over with, at least for the time being, and that the repair done to the levee road along the south shore of Florence lake will be the only cost to the county.

Damage to County.

It is estimated the cost to the county by the flooding of Florence lake will not reach more than \$500.

At the west end of Florence lake a sluice is carrying off water into the bottom north of Carter lake. The Red and Gun club only desires that more water would overflow into Carter lake and the levee was cut through to allow this very thing. A culvert was built just east of Ninth street so as to allow travel along the road.

Property is Not Damaged.

With the water in the river rapidly receding the Omaha Street Railway company finds its property has come through the flood undamaged. On the line from Council Bluffs to Manawa the water from the river came up to the tracks, but the grade was not washed.

In Manawa there is the best stage of water in years. The river overflowed the country to the west and swept over the lake, filling it to the top of the banks.

ROOSEVELT TOURS THE STATE

Will Spend Wednesday and Thursday in Eastern Nebraska.

TALKS HERE WEDNESDAY NIGHT

Auditorium Has Been Engaged—To Start at Hastings Wednesday Morning—Will Go to Kansas Friday.

Former President Theodore Roosevelt will speak at the Auditorium in Omaha Wednesday evening and in Lincoln at the Auditorium, Thursday evening, according to announcement given out at the Roosevelt headquarters in the Rome hotel today.

Mr. Roosevelt will arrive in Hastings early Wednesday morning and begin a two day tour of the state, the first speech being made at Hastings. The itinerary for the two days will be as follows: Wednesday—Hastings, Grand Island, Central City, Clarks, Columbus, Schuyler, North Bend, Fremont, Omaha.

Army Notes

General orders are received by the Department of the Missouri maintaining the enlisted strength of the United States army for home and foreign service. The orders assign the number of men to be detailed by each regiment, company and detachment and the rank which forms a composite part.

The present strength of the army will not be materially affected, the purpose being to reconstruct the strength of the regiments now in service, keeping the number of men in companies and battalions the same and not exceeding the number designated by act of congress 1907.
