George L. Campen describes the hurricane weathered in September, 1808, by the steamship Colon with 200 passengers.

"Passengers and crew were lashed to "Passengers and clew were lasked to the broken mast, to the doors, to everything that give promise of perimanence. We were bound together with ropes. The captain himself was lasked to a broken mast. Water houred continually over the vessel. "At 3 o'clock "Manday evening the storm had abated and we were safe, bit the experience had sobered us and there was little rejoicing."


