

## WILSON ESTATE APPORTIONED

Net Sums to Be Received by Beneficiaries Approved by Crawford.

## CITY GETS THE LARGEST SUM

Old People's Home to Receive \$41,884 and the City \$56,884—Other Organizations to Receive Large Sums.

Net amounts received by the beneficiaries under the will of the late Anna Wilson will be as follows, according to the report of Abraham L. Reed, executor of the will, which was approved by County Judge Bryce Crawford yesterday: Prospect Hill Cemetery association, \$25,884.49; City Mission, \$5,884.49; Old People's home, \$41,884.49; The Creche, \$5,884.49; Child Saving Institute, \$5,884.49; Associated Charities, \$5,884.49; Clarkson Memorial hospital, \$5,000.00; Wise Memorial hospital, \$5,000.00; City of Omaha, \$56,884.49; Heirs of Daniel B. Allen, \$7,350.00.

Total, \$232,256.76.

In reaching these figures the specific bequests first were allowed, debts of the estate were paid, the residuary amount was apportioned among the beneficiaries as ordered by the will, and the inheritance taxes then were deducted.

**Inheritance Tax Paid.**

The inheritance taxes against the first five beneficiaries were five per cent; against the Clarkson and Wise Memorial hospitals, two per cent; and against the city, six per cent. No inheritance tax is assessed against the heirs of Daniel B. Allen, as the bequest to them is in the nature of a repayment of money given Miss Wilson by Allen.

The total amount of the bequests is \$232,256.76; the total inheritance tax, \$12,428.28.

Mr. Reed receives \$5,000 for his services as executor and W. J. Connell, \$5,000 for his services as attorney.

The men of the mission determined that the ladies should not exceed them in hospitality and announced that they would entertain them Monday evening, May 13, at an outdoor "twilight" Mulligan stew and camp fire. The boys of the mission will entertain the girls at a lawn party in the near future, but would not divulge full details.

Mrs. Christoffensen is alleged to have talked severely to Mrs. Gotscher, and the latter became frightened and ran for help in her bare feet. The evidence was contradictory. Mrs. Christoffensen was discharged and her husband fined \$5 and costs.

## FINAL REPORT MADE ON ESTATE OF MISS MERCER

Final report in the matter of the estate of the late Caroline D. Mercer, who was lost overboard in a transatlantic voyage two years ago, shows the estate to be worth \$155,000.32, after payment of all debts. The report was approved by County Judge Bryce Crawford and the property will go to the only heirs, Dr. Nelson S. Mercer and Miss Mary Mercer, brother and sister, each receiving half and each paying an inheritance tax of \$23,125.

## BARLOW DECLINES TO RUN FOR WATER BOARD

Asks the Public to Give Its Support for This Place to F. D. Wead.

**Urges the Re-Election of D. J. O'Brien and Sees in These Two Best Choice for City.**

Milton T. Barlow, president of the Omaha Water board, and a member of it since it was organized ten years ago, ever since having been active in the fight for possession of the waterworks, has formally declined to be a candidate for the republican nomination for another term, on a petition signed and circulated by his friends. And in making his declination he has given his emphatic recommendation that Fred D. Wead be elected to succeed him as a republican; and that D. J. O'Brien be elected to succeed himself as a democrat, both being in harmony with the past action of the board, which was last endorsed at the bond election last August by a vote of twelve to one, and pledged to continue its policy.

Mr. Barlow has written this letter to the World-Herald expressing his views: "As I am now retiring after several years of service upon the water board, I have a very intense interest in the success of the waterworks after it is taken over by the city, and I am deeply concerned in the men who are to compose the water board. Every member should not only be an honest but a capable man. My twenty-seven years' close business acquaintance with F. D. Wead leads me to recommend him as a man well qualified to be a member of the water board. It was this same estimate of him by his friends and the friends of municipal ownership of the water plant that led them to persuade him to become a candidate. I believe the republicans of this city should nominate Wead.

"My association with D. J. O'Brien on the water board and my knowledge of his character and fitness for the place fully justifies me in recommending that the democrats should return O'Brien. He has always protected the interests of the city in this matter.

"The books of the water company, to which we have only recently had access, show a gross income of nearly three-quarters of a million dollars per year. In the hands of competent business men the waterworks will be a splendid asset for Omaha. It would be unwise to let the water plant get out of the control of men who favored its purchase and who favor municipal ownership. I believe our interest in the welfare of the city should lead us to work for the nomination and election of these two men."
