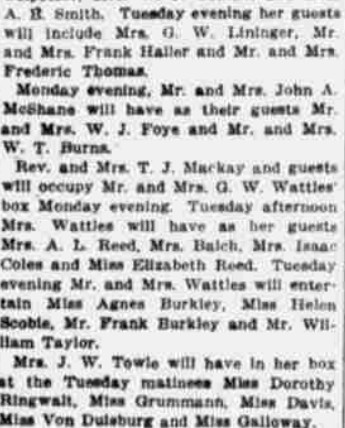

Boxes at Mendelssohn Choir Concerts

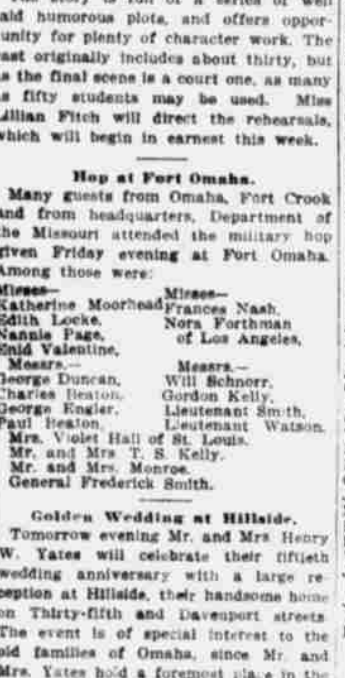
