**SOCIAL SCIENCE IS UP MONDAY**

Arbor Day Is to Be Observed and Some Trees Will Be Placed Around the Club House.

The Omaha Woman's club will have two big days this week—the party in celebration of its nineteenth birthday, Wednesday, and the Arbor day celebration of the social science department and the forestry committee, Monday.

The Monday meeting will start off with a program by the social science department, of which Mrs. N. J. Hiss is leader, when Dr. D. E. Jenkins, president of the University of Omaha, will speak on "The Social Service Significance of the Men and Religion Forward Movement" and E. C. Page on "Nebraska Laws Concerning Women." As this is the last meeting of the season of the department the election of officers will be held.

After the social science meeting the forestry committee, of which Mrs. William Berry of South Omaha is chairman will hold exercises appropriate to Arbor day. Mrs. A. D. Bradley will speak on Arbor day and vines will be planted outside the Metropolitan building, where the club meetings are held. An informal reception will close the afternoon. 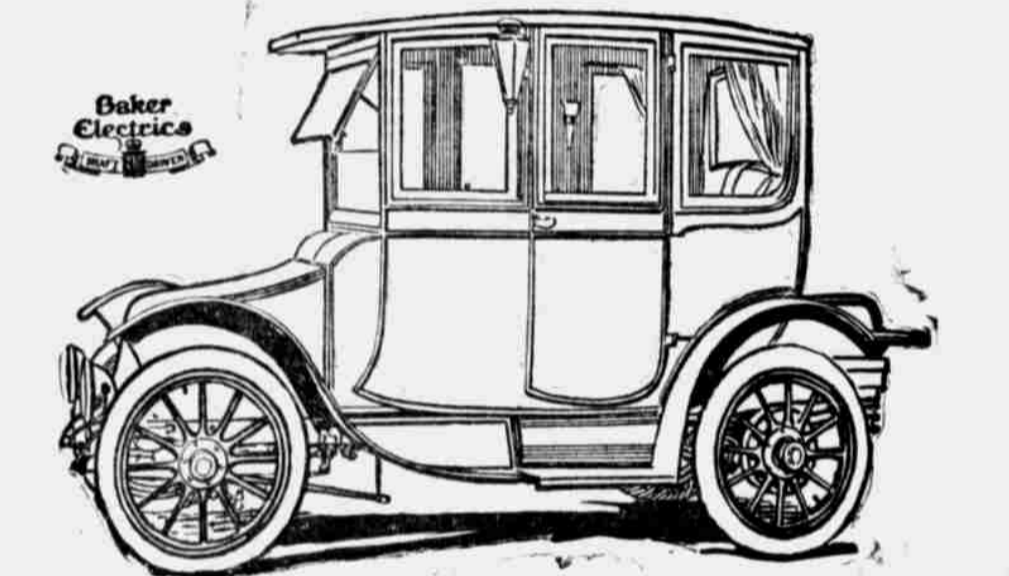
