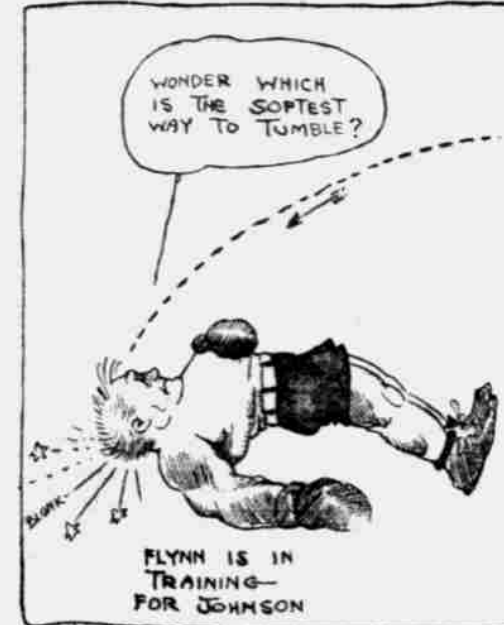

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STATION, LOCOMOTIVE AND EIGHT CARS BURN; TWO TRAINMEN DEAD

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., April 24.—A north-bound Missouri Pacific freight train jumped the track and crashed into the depot at Willis, Kan., today. Peter Garasdo and Frank Lopez, railroad employees, who were on the depot platform, were buried under the wreckage and Garasdo was taken out dead. Lopez's injuries are fatal.

The depot caught fire and the locomotive and eight cars were burned up. The fire threatened to destroy the entire town and the schools were dismissed.

The women formed a bucket brigade and assisted the men in fighting the fire.

SOCIALISTS OF DAKOTA ALLOWED PLACE ON BALLOT

PIERRE, S. D., April 24.—(Special Telegram.)—After a conference with Attorney General Johnson today, Assistant Secretary Nelson decided to stretch a legal point and allow the socialists to have a place on the primary ballot in June. This again puts them in the list of organized parties in the state, with primary rights. The action was taken on the grounds that they were an organized party at the time the law went into effect and were dropped through a misunderstanding as to the requirements of the primary law.

INDOOR MEET DRAWS MANY

Total of 592 Athletes Entered for Events of Saturday.

NEW RELAY FEATURE ADDED

Thirty-Four Grade Schools Will Compete in Relay Race for the Championship of Omaha—Program Being Made.

Thirty-one institutions will be represented at the annual indoor track meet at the Auditorium Saturday night. This number does not include the thirty-four grade schools entered in the relay race for the championship of the city.

The institutions represented will send a total of 592 athletes to the meet, which will be witnessed by a capacity house if the seats continue to sell at the present rate.

J. T. Maxwell of the Young Men's Christian association, who is promoting the meet, has sent the copy to the printer for the program, which will consist of twenty-two large pages. The program gives the number the athletes will carry and the club they represent, the names of the various events, what time they will be run off and who the participants will be.

The abbreviation of every club, school, college and university represented is not to be given.

That the events are good drawing cards are shown by the large number of entries for every track and field event. The Young Men's Christian association and the Omaha schools are well represented.

A new relay feature was added to the list at the last minute. It is the bankers' relay in which clerks from the various banks in Omaha will run a mile race. At present the Omaha National and City National are the only banks represented.

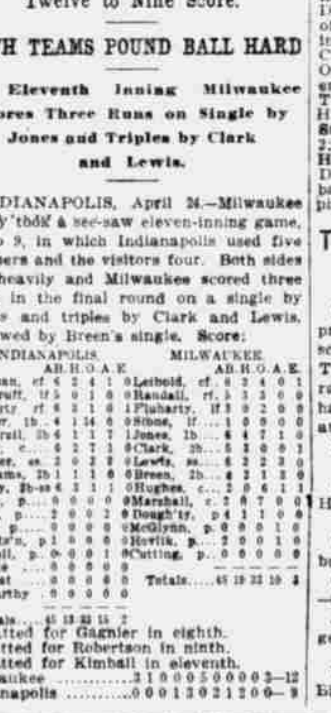
