RANGERS LOSE IN FIFTEENTH

Des Moines Trims Them After Long Pitchers' Contest.

WELCH'S HIT SCORES THE WIN

Hall and Rogge Engage in Battle that Goes Against Omaha Partly Through Errors by Hall's Support.

DES MOINES, April 26.—(Special Telegram)—Des Moines won a fifteen-inning pitchers' battle, 2 to 1, and broke even on the four-game series with the Roughridders. It was a great pitchers' contest between Hall and Rogge, the Sox recruit. Welch supported Hall's downfall as he held Des Moines to seven hits. An error figured in each of Des Moines scores. With the score one to one in the seventh, Des Moines took a lead on a walk, sacrifice and muffed grounder by Kane. Arbogast's men came back in the ninth with characteristic fight and tied it up with a single by Thomson, a sacrifice by Kane and another single by Niehoff. For four more innings Des Moines tried desperately to put across the winning run. Twice there was a man on third, but Hall felled the batters in the pinches. In Omaha's half of the fifteenth, Justice and Johnson got an error, but Rogge felled Justice out at third on Hall's grounder and a few moments later caught Davidson's foul tip.

In the last play, Captain Thomas was spiked by Rogge and Manager Isbell took his place in the lineup. That broke the charm. Kelly was walked and stole second. Kane bungled a throw to first on Isbell's grounder. Kelly going to third. Welch needed the call of the bleachers and knocked a ripping single to left, scoring the winning run.
