STATE WARDS USING CASH

Auditor's Books Show Eleven Institutions Ahead of Appropriations.

CAVINESS SUCCEEDS SHELLHORN

Commandant Hilliard of Soldiers' Home at Milford Said to Be Contemplating Return to His Farm.

From a Staff Correspondent. LINCOLN, April 27.—(Special).—April 1 was the beginning of a new fiscal year for all the state institutions. The appropriations are made for a two-year period and the auditor's books show that eleven of the eighteen institutions have used up more than half the money appropriated for their maintenance for two years.

All four of the normal schools have used up more than half the two-year appropriations. Chadron having made the largest inroads into its cash, and the State Normal at Lincoln, which is the only one of the four which has not exceeded its appropriation.

Gov. Aldrich announces the appointment of A. L. Caviness, now a member of the board of examiners as a member of the State Normal board, taking the place of R. L. Shellhorn, whose term expires in May.

It is announced on seemingly good authority that Commandant Hilliard of the soldiers' home at Milford will soon tender his resignation. It is said Mr. Hilliard desires to devote his time to his farm near Superior.

Interest and Principal. The books of the state auditor show that in one collection of state taxes in Adams county the principal of the state's portion amounted to 3 cents and the interest on the same was 10 cents.

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DISTRICT COURT IN PHELPS

Unusual Point is Raised in Suit Growing Out of Land Deal.

RIVER WASHES AWAY 72 ACRES

Man Who Paid for it on Basis of Old Federal Survey Wants It. Money Returned—Other Cases Considered.

HOLDREGE, Neb., April 27.—(Special).—The district court of this county concluded an important session here Friday evening. The only criminal case was that of the State against Glen Childs, who was arrested originally on a charge of horse stealing.

Unusual Point in Land Case

Some very unusual questions for this part of the state were brought up for adjudication in the case of Knight against Doherty. The case involved a \$2,000 land deal in which H. A. Knight was to exchange 40 acres of land in this county and Buffalo county for land in Kansas, city property in Holdrege and cash.

On the ground that the contract called for 112 acres of land at the stipulated price of \$5 an acre Mr. Doherty asked a proportionate rebate for the missing seventy-two acres and refused to turn over the deed for the Kansas land or make further cash payments.

Pay for Two Tons

After being out for ten hours the jury in the damage case of Sidney Atwood against the Burlington railroad brought in a verdict of \$56 for Atwood. He is a traveling man and had parts of two tons amputated by a Burlington freight train from which he was trying to take his grips after having ridden on an open flat car from Napoleon to Bloomington.

Tourists and Their Jewels

Half the Articles Purchased Abroad Evade the Customhouse Taxes.

"Half of the jewels that come to America are smuggled, identical of the smuggling is done by American tourists and nine times out of ten they lose money by it," said Ludwig Nissen, president of the Precious Stone Importers' association of New York.

"The tourists are many and very long purged, and they have the idea, especially business men who have never had time to pay attention to jewelry, that prices are much lower in Europe than here.

"When a rich man and his wife arrive in Paris, with nothing to do but visit the shops and become enamored of the beautiful gems displayed, the shopkeepers take very good care strongly to confirm this opinion. They have a clever near truth which they use with the greatest effect, that the United States imposes a 60 per cent duty on jewelry.

"And even the lowest price is apt to be higher than it would be in America, for the enormous wealth of our country provides a better market for such a luxury as jewelry. We do business on a larger scale, with a less percentage of profit. And by the same token the American quality is better, for our workshops, paying the largest salaries, attract the best craftsmen of Europe.

"The choicest stones are brought here too. On calling an order to Europe I have often been answered, 'We have no American goods,' meaning none of first quality.

"The bad bargaining of the amateur smuggler may not end when he leaves the store with his purchase. Sailing shortly to another continent, he can hardly return or exchange the goods if for any reason he comes to regret having bought them. And when he attempts to smuggle them through Collector Loeb's custom house he runs a long risk of losing his jewels and his money and his good name to boot.

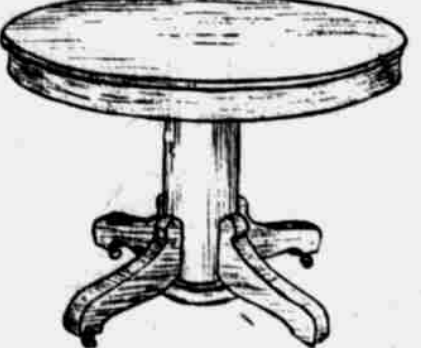
"For the government has agents in those same stores that kindly instructed him in how to avoid paying duty, and his purchase may have been reported to those agents. The government has in this surveillance an auxiliary in our Importers' Protective association, which is shortly to be expanded into the National Jewelers Protective association, so that the forces of all the wholesale and

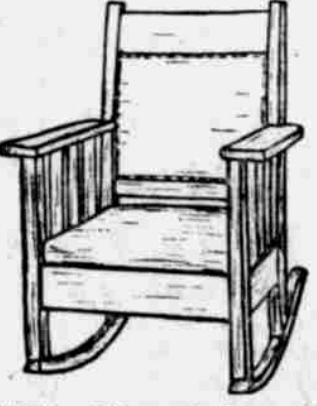
