One is an abrogation of the rule described by democrats as a "gag" rule, which prevented federal employes in the postal service from compaining to con

The bill also contains a provision which would compel newspapers, magazines and other periodicals to publish the names of their managing editors and stockholders their managing entions and stocknowlers who own stock valued at more than 250s. The hill championed by Representative Barnhart of Indiana was amended by Representative Allen of Onio so that daily papers are required to publish this inormation in but one issue a week. The Sarnhart bill also provides that all editorial or reading matter for which muney has been received must be labeled "ad
