

GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Western Crop News from Hard Winter Country Much the Same.

CORN IN SLUGGISH CONDITION It is Receiving Little Support from Bull Leaders and Receipts are Larger, While Cash Demand is Urgent.

Western crop news from the hard winter wheat belt is much the same as it has been following the recent rains. The demand for cash wheat is disappointing, but the other hand very good authorities are predicting a final winter wheat crop at least 25,000,000 bushels, which is considerably below the 1911 crop. On the whole the situation is a very much mixed affair and the trend of the market is doubtful until something definite occurs.

The corn market is very sluggish, receiving little support from bull leaders, and receipts are larger, while the cash demand is not so urgent a character. While the near futures will be held strong by the shortage in feed stocks the distant option may be expected to sell lower.

Liquidation in long wheat carried values lower. Good growing weather has taken the wind out of the market. Cash wheat was low. The corn market was easier on favorable weather and free country offerings. Shipments were weak, surplus offers bringing prices lower yesterday.

Primary wheat receipts were 64,000 bu, and shipments were 22,000 bu, against receipts last year of 35,000 bu, and shipments of 39,000 bu.

Primary corn receipts were 136,000 bu, and shipments were 45,000 bu, against receipts last year of 121,000 bu, and shipments of 1,900,000 bu.

Trading Dull and Uninteresting, with Undertone Firm.

STEEL ISSUES MAKE RECOVERY American Tobacco Declines in Connection with Report that House will Support Review of Court Decision.

NEW YORK, May 2.—The day in the stock market was dull and in most respects uninteresting. The undertone was generally firm and in places decidedly strong. But speculative interest was light with the effect of absence of participation by the public.

Reading after some early hesitation, rose to 17 1/2, with a sympathetic rise in Lehigh Valley. Steel resumed to have recovered in a measure from the chill produced by its very unfavorable quarterly report.

The metal shares were little more than steady, their backwardness being attributed to the general theory that the report of the producers for April is likely to show an increased production.

Stagnation overtakes the line in the early afternoon after another rise in Reading and American Can.

Greater activity in steel was the feature of the last hour, the movement being coincident with advice from trade centers that another advance in finished products is contemplated.

Prices shaded in the final dealings, but the closing was affly steady. The recovery for money interests in the market continued today, although the cash movement to interior points was checked by another advance in the rate of the Pacific coast.
