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H. S. Athletes Have Money in Treasury

A report of the condition of the Omaha High school athletic fund issued today by C. E. Reed, athletic director, shows a balance of \$65.00 in the treasury at present. Part of this sum will be expended for the promotion of track and field events this month. The school will be represented in two out of town events, the state high school track meet at Lincoln and the Missouri Valley Intercollegiate affair will be held at Kansas City, May 11.

John F. Stout, attorney for the World-Herald, apparently bent his efforts toward showing that the dispute related to the legality of the assessment and similar question until repeatedly recalled to the point of issue by Attorneys W. R. Patrick, H. C. Murphy and Samuel Winters.

Winters and Murphy both testified that the conditions of the deed of gift had been strictly complied with and Winters further added that no court in the country would invalidate the gift under the circumstances. City Treasurer John Gillin deposed that he had been interviewed on the O street question by a reporter of the World-Herald. When a statement from the World-Herald purporting to be the words of the treasurer was read, Gillin hemmed and hesitated quite a time before identifying the same. He told the council and mayor that he knew nothing about the whole matter except in so far as it pertained to the assessment books. He said his deputy had gone to the engineer about the matter. He further stated that he wanted to find out about the matter, but did not ask the legal department of the city for advice in the premises. As city clerk, he testified to having been the custodian of the city documents, but did not remember the deed in question.

Gillin testified that it was the practice to pay the interest on bonds out of the principal realized from the sale of the bonds. He stated that his intention in giving publicity to the O street grading district was not to give bitter medicine to the legal department of the city, but to save the interests of the taxpayers. It was brought out, however, that the interests of the taxpayers were most seriously damaged when the title to the strip of property belonging to the city was called into dispute.

Roberts' Memory Poor. City Engineer George Roberts when called to the stand appeared to remember very little about the whole question. He stated that he might have given out the interview accredited to him in the World-Herald, but that he was not sure. "I talked a lot in five minutes," said the engineer. Roberts asserted that he had intended to call the attention of the legal department to the O street matter, but had neglected to do so until after the interview which appeared in the paper.
