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BRYAN IS HOT AFTER HARMON

Nebraskan Makes Savage Attack on Governor in Speeches in Ohio.

CANDIDATE OF WALL STREET

Says Friends of Harmon Tried to Buy Delegates Instructed for Bryan at Convention in Denver Four Years Ago.

TOLEDO, O., May 2.—William Jennings Bryan made an early start today on his second day's speech tour of Ohio in which he is opposing the nomination of Governor Harmon and advocating that of a progressive. His train left here at 2:30 this morning, and the day's speech making was begun at Norfolk at 7 o'clock.

FINDLAY, O., May 2.—William J. Bryan in his speech here today said that since coming into the state he has obtained a letter in evidence that Governor Harmon is favored by Wall street. He said:

"I have stated that as late as February, 1907, Governor Harmon still hoped to be the Wall street candidate for president that year. I am now prepared to add that as late as June, 1908, his friends hoped to nominate him at Denver, notwithstanding that two-thirds of the delegates had been instructed for me. His friends tried to purchase delegates in Ohio, who had been instructed for me."

"I do not say that Mr. Harmon authorized his friends to buy delegates, but I challenge him to deny in writing that his friends did not try to buy votes. If any one will furnish me with a written denial signed by him, I will produce the letter of which I have a copy, showing that the money which was to have been used to purchase delegates was to come from New York, and the men who were to furnish it were prominent in Wall street. Mr. Harmon was then, as now, the choice of Wall street."

Denial from Harmon. COLUMBUS, O., May 2.—Governor Harmon issued a statement today denying the charge made by Mr. Bryan at Findlay. "I most emphatically deny," he said, "that any one authorized by me or by my authority attempted to purchase any delegates at the Denver convention in 1908."

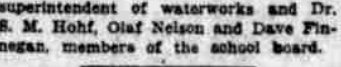
