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Solicitor McCabe Attacks Witness in the Meat Inquiry

WASHINGTON, May 9.—Solicitor McCabe of the Department of Agriculture attacked the credibility of witnesses called by Representative Nelson of Wisconsin in support of his resolution calling for an investigation of the meat inspection service before the house committee on expenditures in the Department of Agriculture today.

McCabe said that among his witnesses would be J. W. Burroughs, a man who spent seven years in the meat inspection service and resigned of his own accord a month ago, when Solicitor McCabe interrupted.

"That man was forced out of the service for borrowing money from packers," he said.

"Yes, Mr. Chairman, that is the practice of the department," said Mr. Nelson. "Charges are denied by attacks on the reputation of others."

Mrs. Caroline B. Crane, on the stand, pointed out the possibility of fraudulent misrepresentation of meat products through the government inspection and declared that the packers had sold the people unwholesome and diseased meats.

The committee adjourned until tomorrow.

Hotel Cashier Says Kimmel Was Alone When Paid Money

ST. LOUIS, May 9.—Harriet R. Wiley of Kansas City was the cashier of the Midland hotel in Kansas City in July, 1908, and is the person who Andrew J. White, the Kimmel claimant now in a Chicago hospital, is seeking to prove one of three men accompanied him when he received money from the cashier the night that Kimmel disappeared.

The deposition of Miss Wiley was read at the recent trial of the Kimmel mystery case and reference to it today showed that she testified that Kimmel when he received the money was unaccompanied. The barber at the hotel, whose deposition was also read, corroborated Miss Wiley's testimony.

Foss Censures Bay State Senate

BOSTON, May 9.—Governor Foss censured the senate today in a special message for rejecting the bill permitting voters to express their preference for United States senators.

The governor stated that the people of the state would find it difficult to appreciate any sympathy with the action of the senate in defeating the bill in opposition to a popular demand and after it had passed the house.

The governor also pointed out that the people had already exercised their right to express a preference for president and will insist on the lesser privilege regard-
