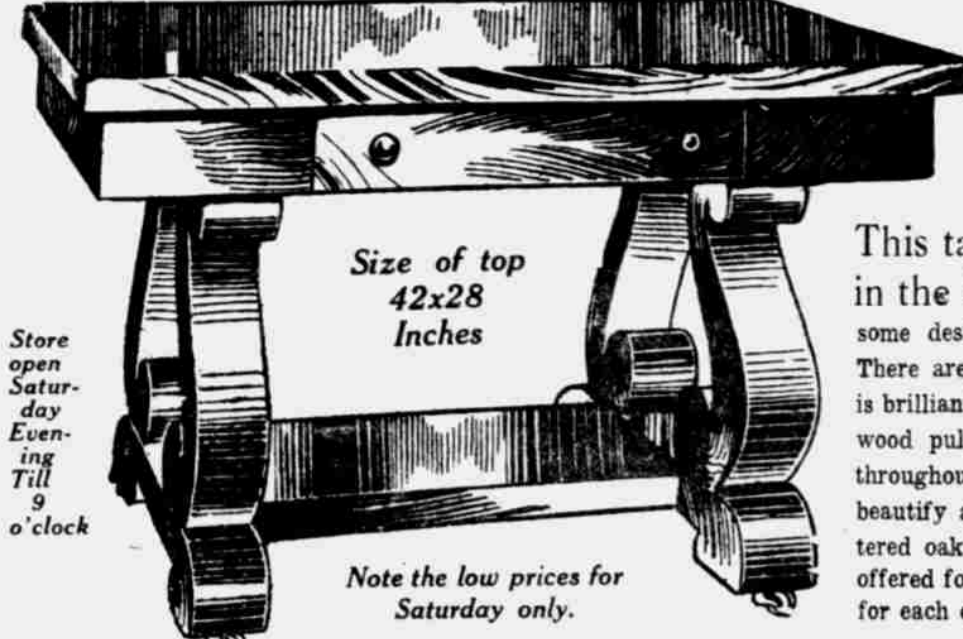

SUPT. QUIVEY GIVES ADDRESS

Business Meeting is Held at Paxton Hotel, Noonday Lunch Preceding Disposal of Routine Matters.

Plattering reports were made and all old officers were re-elected at the annual meeting of the Nebraska Children's Home society, held Wednesday at the Paxton hotel. The business session was presided by a noonday luncheon. President Alfred C. Kennedy was in the chair and the routine matters were interspersed with music and interesting talks. Mrs. Rudd contributed two solos and Rev. Hicks of Des Moines delivered an address. Reports of the treasurer and superintendent were made. Quivey, superintendent of the Beatrice district, gave a very interesting talk, showing conditions from which children are sometimes freed and how the society is able to better their condition. Max Kyle of the Hastings district also gave a very interesting talk on the work in her district.

Committee is Appointed. By a vote of the society the chair was authorized to appoint a committee on legislation. In closing his report State Superintendent Quivey said: "In looking back over the work of the last year I do so with very much pleasure, for while it has in many ways been a strenuous year's work, receiving so many children and looking after and assisting many cases where we did not receive them, and the fact of the very severe winter, which increased the work and made the conditions very unpleasant in this particular part of the work. Yet when I consider what has been accomplished by the hearty co-operation of

the public generally, the number of children we have been able to place in good homes, and by so doing we have been able to make very many happy hearts by bringing together the homeless child and the childless home, the unpleasant part is very much cherished, for we remember that we have been feeding the hungry and clothing the naked" and have a right to claim the gratitude of Him who has said, "If you will give a cup of cold water in my name."

Gratitude is Expressed.

"In closing I wish to express my gratitude to all who have assisted in making it possible to accomplish the great work which we have the past year to our many friends who have so generously remembered this work in the giving of their means, to the clerics of the state who have given our workers the courtesy of their pulpits to present the interest of the homeless children, to the press, which has always been willing to give both time and space, as well as editorial endorsement to assist in caring for the homeless children; to the medical profession for assistance and advice in their special lines; and to all who have rendered the help which has made it possible for the society to accomplish the results of the year's work; to all these we wish to express our heartfelt thanks and gratitude.

"In looking forward to the year to come, I do so with very much encouragement, for by the generous assistance and endorsement of the public we hope and expect to accomplish a greater amount of practical Christian work in the year to come than in the year just past, by taking these homeless children, who, in many cases are starving for the love and plan their father and mother and plan their that which strengthens the body but that love and care which we believe is the just due to every homeless child, and by so doing co-operate with Him who has said, 'Leave your fatherless children and I will care for them' and has promised to be a Father to the fatherless.

SIoux CITY OFFICIALS SAY OMAHA STREETS ARE DIRTY

That the sanitary condition of the streets of Omaha did not favorably impress two of Sioux City's city officials is evident by the following notice published in a Sioux City paper: The streets of Sioux City are cleaner than the streets of Omaha and South Omaha, declares Councilman E. O. Wesley, head of the street department. He has returned from Sioux City, where he went with City Engineer Fred C. Smith to inspect paving. The South Omaha streets, Mr. Wesley said, look like they had not been cleaned this spring. Omaha streets are cleaner, but do not come up to the Sioux City standard, he asserted.

SCHOOLS ENTER CAMPAIGN

Superintendent Graff Sends Out Circular on Know Omaha.

EXCURSIONS ARE TO BE MADE

Omaha Commercial College Makes a Trip to the Smelting Works—Preachers to Take Up the Plan.

Superintendent E. L. Graff has sent a circular letter to all principals of schools, urging them to join with the Commercial club in the "Know Omaha Better" campaign. Principals are requested to call the attention of the children to the articles in the daily press dealing with Omaha. The manner in which the material should be presented is left to the principals. Interest in the campaign has become more active and the promoters of the project are securing prompt assistance.

As a start to the campaign the Omaha Commercial college students went Thursday afternoon on a tour of the smelter. Escorted by the teachers of the school and with the superintendents at the smelter as cicerones they learned something of the greatest metal refinery in the United States.

The home trade excursions of the Commercial club Thursday afternoon also has been classified in the course of studies for knowing Omaha. J. A. C. Kennedy, chairman of the civic committee in charge of the campaign, reported that many letters from preachers and priests are coming in, very many each promising to start the week at his church with a sermon or discourse on Omaha. Probably none will talk on Omaha-made goods or elucidate the workings of factories and the like, but practically all will talk on Omaha from educational, governmental and sociological standpoints at least.

GRADING HAS STARTED ON THE NEW WEST BOULEVARD

Grading of the new outer boulevard, through the property donated by J. E. George, has been started by G. W. Condon. The street will be graded from Leavenworth street, near Elmwood park, to a point north of Happy Hollow club. This work is to be finished by October. It necessitates the removal of 80,000 cubic yards of earth. The boulevard will be from 120 to 200 feet wide, all within an excess of 120 feet to be parked.

BIG PERSONAL INJURY CASE GOES TO TRIAL

W. B. Hammond's \$15,000 personal injury damage suit against C. L. Ramsdell for assault and battery, alleged to have been committed two years ago, is on trial before Judge Willis G. Sears in the law division of the district court. Hammond is a larger man than Ramsdell. Ramsdell says he could not have assaulted him and Hammond was the aggressor. Ramsdell represented a film renting concern, and Hammond, a dissatisfied customer quarreled with him. Ramsdell telephoned for a policeman, who stopped the fight.

EXPRESSMEN'S DELIVERY COMPANY TO EXPAND

Two extra floors are to be added to the five-story building occupied by the Expressmen's Delivery company, 218, 22 and 23 North Eleventh street. Work on the addition has begun. The company's business has grown so in the last year that it was found necessary to make the addition for storage purposes. The addition will cost \$15,000. It will be completed by July 15.
