ROOSEVELT AND HARMON WIN

Colonel Will Have All Ohio Delegates Except Sixteen.
PLURALITY IS ABOUT 20,000

Harmont's Vote is Greater Than That of Roosevelt—Governor Carries All Districts Except Three.
COLUMBUS, O., May 22.—Nearly complete returns from yesterday's Ohio presidential primary in hand at noon today indicate that Colonel Roosevelt won thirty-two of forty-two delegates to the republican national convention selected in twenty-one congressional districts and that President Taft was given ten district delegates or slightly less than a third of the total number named.

Harmont Has Delegates at Large.
Governor Harmont on the democratic ticket, unlike Colonel Roosevelt, will not be forced to make a further fight for delegates at large as the democratic call specifies that the winner of the presidential preference primary shall name his own delegates-at-large.

The report of the shot which was from a .22 caliber revolver brought John Bauer, sexton of the cemetery to the scene.
