

Y. M. C. A. HAS GREAT YEAR

Reports of Several Departments Eclipse Those of Other Years.

ALL OLD OFFICERS RE-ELECTED

Classes for Foreigners Well Attended—Thousands Attend Meetings in Auditorium and at Shops.

With the exception of one or two departments, the fiscal year of 1912 of the Young Men's Christian association, which ended May 1, was the most successful in the history of the organization.

George F. Gilmore was re-elected president; David O'Connell, vice president; Paul Kuhns, treasurer; and Frank Garvin, recording secretary.

The total membership on May 1 was shown to be 1,574, a slightly lower figure than last year.

Forty-five shop meetings were held at noon in the various factories and plants. The attendance was 1,124.

Twelve hundred were enrolled in the physical department, 810 being men and 388 boys.

The swimming campaign inaugurated last year proved a success.

From a financial standpoint, the Omaha Young Men's Christian association did remarkably well, ending with a healthy balance above all expenses.
