SOCIAL BLADE BILKS MANY

Man Claiming to Be Son of Herrman the Great Disappears.

HE UNLOADS SNIDE JEWELRY

Man Who is Said to Have a Record Gets Into Good Graces of Business Men and Plays His Tricks on Them.

Carl Neuman, alias Carl Herrman, alias Pholemon, claiming to be a son of Herrman the Great, for several weeks a supposed business man in Omaha, has been expelled from the Commercial club following his sudden disappearance about May 13. Since that time several unpleasant things have been said and heard about him, and now it all comes out that he hoodwinked the Omaha Ad club and others.

The young man came to Omaha some time in December and began making wax and other kinds of figures. It soon became known that he was the son of Herrman the Great, a world renowned magician. He traveled in the best of society and to cap the climax was asked to perform a few of his father's mysterious tricks before the Ad club's beef-steak dinner last month. His stories and tricks savored of the uncut and he did not please the audience.

Said to Be a Faker. An investigation was started and it was found that Herrman the Great never had any children and this man who was manufacturing about as a son was a faker. Last year he worked in Kansas City making wax figures and went under the name of Pholemon. While there he pawned a supposed valuable diamond ring for \$5.

At Nokomis, Ill., he borrowed \$300 on a cluster of very good imitation diamonds, which pin was supposed to have been presented to his father by the sultan of Turkey. The cluster was left with the Nokomis National bank. Thinking the bank not a safe place for the pin the cashier took it to St. Louis to be deposited, when it was first learned that the diamonds were fakes and were mounted on cheap plated setting. It is alleged that a few Omaha people were fleeced out of various sums of money.
