ROOSEVELT OBJECTS TO ROOT

McHarg Declares Colonel's Forces Will Not Abide by Selection.

ROSEWATER MAKES STATEMENT

Acting Chairman of the National Committee Says Delegates Will Have Opportunity to Elect Chairman.

CHICAGO, May 5.-Ormsby McHarg of New York, one of the managers of Colonel Theodore Roosevelt's campaign for the republican presidential nomina-tion, last night declared that the Roosevelt forces would refuse to abide by the selection of United States Senator Ellhu Root of New York, as temporary chairof the national convention.

McHarg said that the Roosevelt managers would insist on the naming of a policies. The names of Governor Herert S. Hadley of Missouri, Governor Hiram W. Johnson of California and Senator Moses E. Clapp of Minnesota were mentioned by McHarg as being acceptable in this connection to the Roose

McHarg spent several hours in Chicago today with the Illinois Roosevelt managers on his way to St. Paul, where tomorrow he will meet a delegation from the state of Washington to map out plans for the presentation of Washin Chicago. McHarg said he would have charge of all Roosevelt contests to be taken before the republican national committee this year, as he did four years ago for President Taft.
