

ROOSEVELT OBJECTS TO ROOT

McHarg Declares Colonel's Forces Will Not Abide by Selection.

ROSEWATER MAKES STATEMENT

Acting Chairman of the National Committee Says Delegates Will Have Opportunity to Elect Chairman.

CHICAGO, May 25.—Ormsby McHarg of New York, one of the managers of Colonel Theodore Roosevelt's campaign for the republican presidential nomination, last night refused to abide by the selection of United States Senator Elihu Root of New York, as temporary chairman of the national convention.

McHarg said that the Roosevelt managers would insist on the naming of a chairman in accord with the Roosevelt policies. The names of Governor Herbert S. Hadley of Missouri, Governor Liram W. Johnson of California and Senator Moses E. Clapp of Minnesota were mentioned by McHarg as being acceptable in this connection to the Roosevelt forces.

McHarg spent several hours in Chicago today with the Illinois Roosevelt managers on his way to St. Paul, where tomorrow he will meet a delegation from the state of Washington to map out plans for the presentation of Washington's contests to the contest committee in Chicago.

McHarg said he would have been charged, if all Roosevelt contests to be taken before the republican national committee this year, as he did four years ago for President Taft.

Root Not Acceptable. "When the convention meets," said McHarg, "the Roosevelt strength will be such that we will control, absolutely. We propose to organize that strength along lines that will not be at all comfortable for Senator Root to preside."

McHarg delivered a keynote speech who is out of sympathy with Colonel Roosevelt and the progressive cause. There is no other side to that question.

Charles Nagel, secretary of commerce and labor, it was announced, had decided not to sit on the contest committee of the national organization and had designated his proxy as national commissioner of Missouri to Congressman Richard Barthold of Missouri.

William Hayward, secretary of the national committee, during the day received the papers in contests from Georgia and Missouri at large and from the First, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Seventh, Tenth and Twelfth Georgia districts.

Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms Lewis of the democratic national convention, to be held at Baltimore, inspected seating arrangements and other details for the purpose of getting ideas on which to determine similar arrangements for the Baltimore convention.

First Ballot Not Decisive. Neither Taft nor Roosevelt will pledge delegates, the required number to nominate, in the republican national convention, according to opinions expressed during a discussion of the probable lineup by members of the national committee here today.

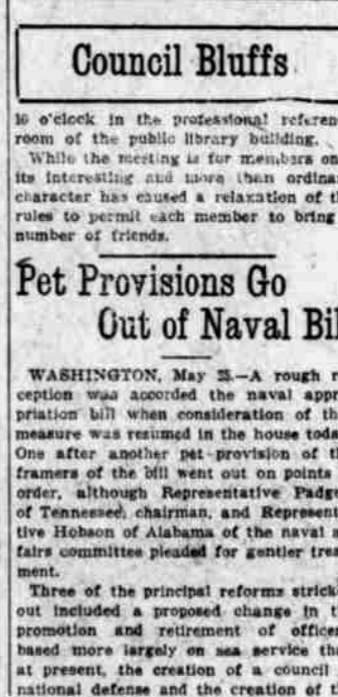
The members of the national committee who have considered the matter do not expect a fight to be made on the selection of Elihu Root as temporary chairman of the convention.

Victor Rosewater, acting chairman of the republican national committee, who will in that capacity open the national republican convention in Chicago next month, read the statement of Ormsby McHarg with considerable interest.

He does not believe the selection of a temporary chairman will be carried to the floor of the convention, but declared that if the delegates desired to select a temporary chairman in that manner they would have an opportunity to do so.

The choice by the national committee of a temporary chairman, as everybody knows," said Mr. Rosewater, "is in the nature of a recommendation, which the convention ordinarily accepts. If Senator Root was a satisfactory chairman of the convention which nominated Mr. Roosevelt in 1904, it does not appear why he should not be equally satisfactory for the same position in 1912.

WEST END PARK TO COME

Last Obstacle Removed in Way of Park Commissioners.

OWNERS HAVE GIVEN CONSENT

Eastern Capitalists Relinquish Rights to Property Situated Between Ferry Addition and Union Pacific Bridge.
