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AURORA MAN IS PARDONED

Governor Frees Joseph H. Edmondson, Convicted of Embezzlement. DOUGLAS COUNTY MEN BAPTIZED

Two Convicts Are Taken to First Christian Church and Immersed—Filibert Gots Parole for Operation.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, May 26.—(Special Telegram.)—The pardon board was busy yesterday and dealt out clemency to three Joseph H. Edmondson of Aurora, who came to the prison in February to serve a three-year term for embezzlement from an estate of which he was administrator.

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It was shown at the trial that he had kept no accounts, but had depended on his check stubs to make up his statements from and that he had paid out money to the girls who were the heirs, to keep them in school and pay other expenses. The checks and stubs were lost, he claimed, when in moving his office his desk tumbled from a wagon and broke open, the papers being carried away by the wind. There was a difference of opinion as to how much of the estate's money he was responsible for and he had nothing to show for what had been expended.

Frank Hansen, sent up from Omaha for bigamy, was paroled. He was divorced and married again before the statutory limit had expired. He is ill with appendicitis and has had no operation and needs another. Operation for Filibert. Charles Filibert of Omaha, sent up for from three to fifteen years for robbery in November, was granted thirty days' parole to go to a hospital and be operated on. His relatives were taken to him in Omaha, but his condition is such that he cannot stand the trip. He will not submit to an operation in the prison hospital and it is probable he will be taken to a hospital in Lincoln.

Many New Auto Taxes. This was a record day for new automobile licenses, 143 being recorded in the office of the secretary of state. Thursday there were eighty-seven ordered and the highest previous record was ninety-seven one day last year.

Two Convicts Baptized. Two convicts in the penitentiary who have expressed conversion to religion were taken out today and baptized in the First Christian church. They are John Ell and Jesse Chappell, the latter a negro. Both are from Douglas county and have been in the prison for some time. John Ell for breaking and entering and Chappell for forgery.

Tom Davis, the convict just acquitted of murder for the killing of John Strong, has been put to work on the prison farm. He has a good record as a convict out of date of the killing episode.

Church Body Has Ceasars. The classes of the English branch of the Reformed church this morning passed a resolution condemning President Taft for revoking the order of the Indian commissioner forbidding the wearing of any distinctive religious garb by teachers in Indian schools. The order was directed against the Catholic sisters.
