J. J. McLain, 84 Years Old. Comes When Omaha is Saratoga.

OLDEST METHODIST IN STATE

In Earlier Days He Engaged in the Preighting Business Between This City and Denver,

Colorado.

J. J. Niclain, aged 84 years, one of the earliest settlers in Omaha, died of old age at his home, 2814 North Twenty-fifth street, at 6:30 o'clock Monday morning. The funeral will be held at 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon from the residence Williams of the First Methodist church will officiate. The interment will be in Prospect Hill cemetery.

Mr. McLain was born in Pennsylvania Mr. McLain was born in Pennsylvania May 16, 1525. When a small boy he moved with his parents to Trumbull county, Ohio, and attended the public schools there. When 15 years old his parents died. For nine years after that he remained in Obic. On May 2, 186, he was united in marriage with Mary E. Fales. In 1887 the The couple landed in Omaha, or in the Saratoga, which at that time was near Twenty-fourth and Ames avenne. Mr. McLain lived in Omaha after his arrival here until his death. He erected a house in Saratoga, but moved nearer the center of Omaha as the town

Escaped from Indians. in 168 bir. McLain engaged in the freighting business between Omaha and Denver, and many stories were told by him of the harrowing experiences with in 1868 Mr. McLain engaged in the him of the harrowing experiences with and narrow escapes from the Indians. He was a member of the first surveying party that went out for the Union Pacific.

During his first years in Omaha he boined the First Methodist church and was a member of it for thirty years, after which he transferred his membership to Trinity, of which he was a member when he died. He was known as the oldest Methodist in Omaha. For fifteen years Methodist in Omaha. For fifteen years he led the choir at the First Methodist church and his wife was the leading suprano. Up to the time of his death Mr. McLain and his wife were frequently called upon to sing at pioneer gatherings. Mr. McLain was one of the first members of the board of trustees of the Methodist hospital. He was a member of the


