

PIONEER RESIDENT EXPIRES

J. J. McLain, 84 Years Old, Comes When Omaha is Saratoga. OLDEST METHODIST IN STATE In Earlier Days He Engaged in the Freightling Business Between This City and Denver, Colorado.

J. J. McLain, aged 84 years, one of the earliest settlers in Omaha, died of old age at his home, 204 North Twenty-fifth street, at 4:30 o'clock Monday morning. The funeral will be held at 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon from the residence. Rev. Williams of the First Methodist church will officiate. The interment will be in Prospect Hill cemetery.

Mr. McLain was born in Pennsylvania May 18, 1828. When a small boy he moved with his parents to Trumbull county, Ohio, and attended the public schools there. When 15 years old his parents died. For nine years after that he remained in Ohio. On May 2, 1856, he was united in marriage with Mary E. Fales. In 1857 the bride and groom left Ohio and came west. The couple landed in Omaha, or in the town of Saratoga, which at that time was near Twenty-fourth and Ames avenue. Mr. McLain lived in Omaha after his arrival here until his death. He erected a house in Saratoga, but moved nearer the center of Omaha as the town built up.

PAVING OPERATIONS HELD UP

Modification of McCaffery Decision Needed to Untangle Mattes. COURT WILL BE URGED TO ACT

City Attorney Rine and Commissioner McGovern Will Appeal to the Nebraska Supreme Bench. City commissioners will request supreme court to give the motion filed by the city for a modification of the decision in the case of Hugh McCaffery precedent over other cases now pending. The request will be made because all paving operations are being held up here until the ruling of the court is modified or explained in such a manner as to dispel all doubt about the proper procedure in the creation of improvement districts and the levying of taxes.

Commissioner Ryder has introduced a resolution at a meeting of the directory and it will be submitted to the supreme court by City Attorney Rine and Thomas McGovern, superintendent of public works. The resolution asks that the city's motion be taken out of the ordinary routine of litigation and considered and passed on at the earliest possible day.

Levy District Limited. According to the opinion handed down in the McCaffery case several months ago, taxes for paving cannot be levied outside the improvement district. It also raises a grave doubt as to the legality of all proceedings heretofore followed in the creation of paving districts in the city.

Property holders not abutting the street to be paved cannot be taxed, the court holds, and the law providing a schedule of the amount of taxes to be paid by the residents in an improvement district is thereby held void. Omaha has followed this law and all property owners in a district have been taxed, heaviest tax being levied on the property abutting the street to be paved.

Attorney Rine and Mr. McGovern will go to Lincoln and urge the most stringent action. Paving petitions are now in the hands of the legal department, but will not be passed on as to sufficiency until some modification or explanation of the supreme court opinion is secured.

COMMISSIONERS IGNORE ALL ANONYMOUS DEMANDS Police Commissioner Ryder serves notice on writers of anonymous letters and residents who talk by telephone but refuse to divulge their identity, that no attention will be paid their complaints. Within the last few days dozens of letters and telephone calls from anonymous persons have been received by the com-

missioner. These range from mild entreaties to messages demanding immediate action to eliminate such evil. "We will be glad to consider calls from those who give us their names," said Colonel Ryder, "and we can keep the names in confidence, but it would be useless to answer calls from unknown citizens."

Bishop Bristol to Come About July 1 Bishop Frank M. Bristol, D. D., LL. D., who was assigned to Omaha by the Minneapolis conference of the Methodist church, will not come to Omaha until July 1. Owing to an operation for appendicitis which Bishop Bristol underwent a few months ago in South America, where he was recently being located, and to the immense strain of work since the start of the present conference Bishop Bristol will rest at the home of his son in Minneapolis during the month of June, after which he will move to Omaha.

NUDITY TO BE STOPPED AT SWIMMING RESORTS Joe B. Hummel, commissioner of parks and public property, will assign a special officer to patrol the shores of Carter lake and warn the young and the old that swimming without suits must be stopped. Sundry several hundred swimmers enjoyed the waters of Carter lake, the majority of them without bathing suits. As there are numerous visitors to the lake, and excursion parties, the swimmers were an embarrassing nuisance. Mr. Hummel believes that in time the commission will make some arrangement to furnish suits, but funds will not now permit it. An officer will go on duty Sunday to enforce the ruling of the commissioner.

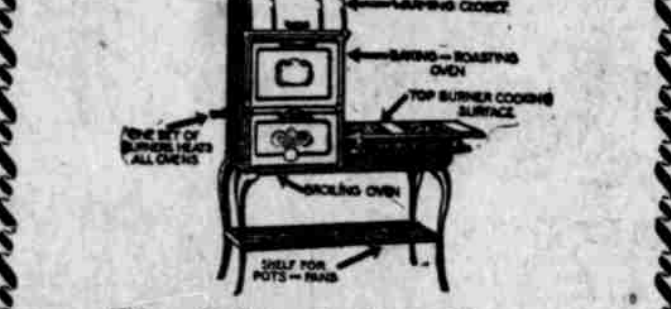

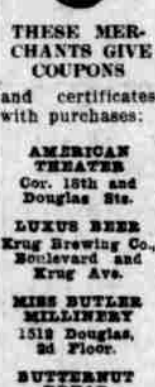
