FLACK AND WEAD SPEAK

Omaha Delegates Address Oil Men's Convention.

SUPPORT OF OMAHA IS PLEDGED

Commercial Club Will Do All It Can to Aid in Developing the Oil Fields of Wyoming.

CASPER, Wyo., May 29.—(Special Telegram.)—Speaking today before 20 delegates to the annual convention of Wyoming Oil Men's association in session here, F. D. Wead and John P. Flack, representing the Omaha Commercial club, declared their faith in the greatness of Wyoming's oil fields and pledged support of business interests of the Nebraska metropolis to the development of the oil industry in Wyoming. Mr. Flack is president of the First National bank of Omaha and Mr. Wead is a member of the Omaha Commercial club's committee on development of Wyoming oil fields. Representatives of the Denver Chamber of Commerce also pledged support of the business interests, while officials of the Northwestern, Burlington and Union Pacific railroads, declared their lines would do all in their power to further development of the industry.

The convention adjourned last evening after adopting a resolution endorsing the passage by the Wyoming legislature of the Kansas Blue Sky law to regulate corporations selling stock in the state and resolutions seeking to initiate a movement to secure uniform legislation regarding oil tests in states where Wyoming oil products are marketed. The delegates were guests of the Midwest Oil company at luncheon and tonight were entertained by a concert, fireworks display and a Dutch lunch at the new refinery of the Natrona Pipe Line & Refinery company.

reason at the last general election. The polls did not close until 9 o'clock last night, and as a result the vote was very late in being counted.

Statement for Roosevelt.
Early today Borden D. Whiting, chairman of the Roosevelt executive committee in New Jersey, made the following statement:

"New Jersey has come through handsomely. The men who make up the rank and file of the republican party and who carried the state by 20,000 at the end of Roosevelt's administration, have shown that they are still loyal to their old leaders. They hail with delight his return to the command of the republican party and will give him 20,000 again in November. Roosevelt has unshaken the old machine leaders and will now turn the party back to its first principles."

The New Jersey primary is the last but one (South Dakota) to be held before the conventions.

DIRECT CAMPAIGNS ENDED

The republican candidates will close this week and managers and their assistants will be in Chicago Monday for the opening of the battle before the national committee. The Taft attorneys, former Senator Dick of Ohio and Fred C. Bryan of Washington, have completed their defense of all the cases where the Roosevelt forces are contesting delegates. It is understood all briefs and evidence will be filed with Secretary Hayward in Chicago before tonight.

Taft Men Will Support Root.
The attitude of Taft managers here indicates that they will lend their full support to Chairman New in the effort to seat Senator Root as temporary chairman. It is understood the Taft forces were not advised of the selection of Senator Root until after the latter had accepted Mr. New's invitation, but have seized what they believe to be an opportunity to weld together New York's delegates and other delegations that will support the national committee upon this issue.

Senator Dixon predicted that Governor Hadley of Missouri would be the Roosevelt choice for temporary chairman.

"That, of course, is subject to change if conditions change," said the senator. "I believe, however, that Governor Hadley's name will be proposed for the place and that William R. Pendegast of New York, despite recent illness, will make the speech placing Colonel Roosevelt in nomination."

President Still Confident.
President Taft's belief that he has enough delegates pledged and unpledged for him to control the convention was not shaken by the victory of Colonel Roosevelt in the New Jersey primaries. White house officials made no statement, but Taft leaders who saw the president today would not recede from the president's own figures made public in several of his New Jersey speeches

which he said gave him thirty more than necessary to nominate.

Friends of President Taft admitted today that much depended on the republican national committee. They were satisfied they would, that the committee would be fair to Taft.

Taft interested in Platform.
It was stated positively that the president's name would be presented to the convention no matter what happened. Just how far Mr. Taft will go in making plans for the convention was not particularly in the platform, it is said, and in the selection of a man to present his name to the convention.

Mr. Taft was in the White House study, working and glancing over the returns from New Jersey until 2 o'clock this morning. He was at his desk before 9 o'clock. Although he showed the effects of his hard travel he was smiling, but did not mention New Jersey to his early visitors. No general conference of the president's supporters was scheduled for today, but several dropped in, including Attorney General Wickersham, Senator Crane of Massachusetts and Secretary MacVeagh.

HORSE KILLED AND RIDER INJURED BY LIGHTNING

MOORCROFT, Wyo., May 29.—(Special.)—Wells Green, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. T. Green of this place, is suffering from the effects of an electrical shock received during a thunder storm. Green was riding a horse when struck by the bolt, which passed through his body from head to foot and entering the body of the horse killed the animal outright. Green was found later lying on the dead horse in an unconscious condition. The drum of Green's left ear was broken and he was burned about the head and legs, but will recover.

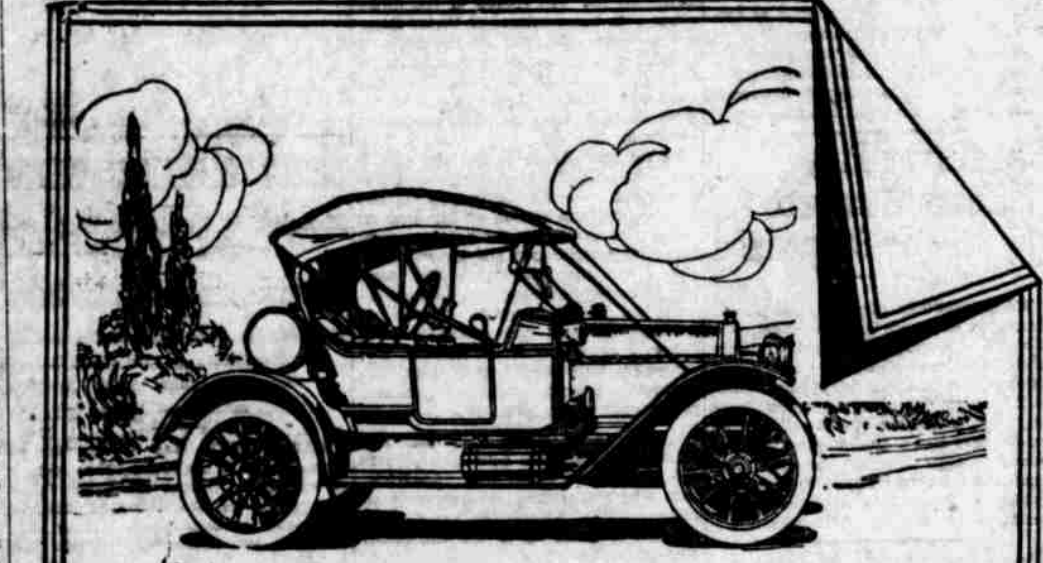
