

Ohio's Convention Instructs Big. Six For the President

COLUMBUS, O., June 5 .- Ohio's republican state convention closed its first tession in short order today after awarding President Taft the six delegates-atlarge to the national convention by a vote of 3901/2 to 3621/2. The state ticket, including the new congressman-at-large, will be chosen at the adjourned session which was called for July 2.

President Taft's strength in the convention was plainly evident as soon as the meeting had been called to order. In the report of the credentials committee, the first order of business, eleven state delegates were added to the Taft strength without a protest from the minority.

In the first test of strength, a roll call on the minority report endorsing Colonel Roosevelt, the delegates voted 3931/2 for Taft and 259% for Roosevelt. Few speeches were made and these were given little attention by the delegates, who appeared to have made up their minds as to their votes.

"The action of today's convention clearly shows that the republicans still have confidence in President Taft and the result of the state convention will go far in determining the vote at the Chicago convention," said L. C. Laylin, Taft's campaign manager.

The result of the convention today gives President Taft fourteen of Ohio's forty-eight delegater to the national convention and Colonel Roosevelt thirtyfour.
