

GRIMP IN ARMY MANEUVERS

Taft's Veto of Appropriation Bill Will Cause Delay.

SMITH CALLS OFF ACTIVITIES

It is Anticipated that Money for Maneuvers Later in the Season Will Be Appropriated by Congress.

Summer maneuvers planned for several months and the regular army of the Department of the Missouri are off until further notice. This word has been received by General Frederick A. Smith from Washington and is caused by the president's veto of the army appropriation bill.

The bill, a provision in which struck at Major General Wood, which, if made a law, would have removed the general from his position as chief of staff, and upon which ground the president vetoed the measure, carried with it the appropriation fund from which all summer maneuvers were to be carried on. The money the regular army has to go on is barely enough to keep up the regular standing force and until an appropriation is granted, anything in the way of army practice and maneuvers is postponed.

The Tentative Instructions.

Instructions received Saturday which were tentative and subject to change included the detail to Pole Mountain, Wyo., of both regiments of the Nebraska National Guard. They were to entrain for Pole Mountain to assemble at the maneuvering grounds July 7 and to remain there with the regular troops of Fort D. A. Russell until July 12. The Wyoming and Colorado militia were also to take part. The Colorado militia to be in maneuver practice from July 17 to 27. General Smith was ordered to take command.

The maneuver duty of the posts at Forts Mackenzie, Meade and Robinson, also to be commanded by General Smith, is called off, including the encampment of the Iowa state militia at Iowa Falls, August 12.

It is predicted that an appropriation will be put through congress probably by August 1, which will permit of the Iowa maneuvers, but will prevent the Wyoming maneuvers because of the lateness of the season.

Club Women Stop in Omaha Enroute to the Convention

One hundred club women and three club husbands, including a psychology professor, were in Omaha from 1 to 3 o'clock Monday afternoon on their way from northeastern states to San Francisco, to attend the biennial convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, June 25 to July 5. They were met by local women, whirled around the city in automobiles furnished by the Ad club, and sent off laden with crackers, candy and complexion creams given as souvenirs by local manufacturers.

Miss Louis Graham, transportation manager for the delegation, is the youngest woman in the bunch. She is editor of "Club Notes," the woman's club column of the Cleveland Leader and will write biennial matter for the Associated Press. Others prominent in the Ohio delegation are Mrs. George Zimmerman of Fremont, chairman of the civic committee of the General Federation; Mrs. Elmer G. Lawrence of Cincinnati, corresponding secretary for the Women's National Rivers and Harbors congress; Mrs. E. L. Buchwalter, an ex-president of the state federation; Miss Emelie McVea, dean of women in Cincinnati university; Mrs. Charles F. Walker, state delegate-at-large; Mrs. Samuel B. Sheath of Tippin, an ex-president of the state federation; Mrs. O. J. Hodge of Cleveland, honorary regents of the Ohio Daughters of the American Revolution.

Mrs. W. B. Williams of Lapeer, state president, heads the Michigan delegation, among which are Mrs. R. H. Ashbaugh, president of the Detroit Federation of Women's Clubs' editor of the Club Women and state recording secretary, and Mrs. Anna Walters, chairman of the state civic committee.

Omaha women who furnished cars in addition to those of the Ad club were Mrs. George Joslyn, Mrs. C. Vincent, Mrs. Ed Phelan, Mrs. James C. Dahman, Mrs. F. L. Haller, Mrs. N. H. Nelson and Mrs. T. F. Stroud.
