at the Convention. CROWD MERCILESS TO SPEAKERS Chairman's Gavel Beats Incessantly While Shouts and Jeers Interrupt the Orators in Highest Flights. By ANTHONY M. EASTERLING. CHICAGO, June 19.—(Special Telegram.) -When I walked into the Collseum today to witness my first national political convention, the confusion incident to the attempt of 12,000 patriotic souls to voice the glory of their patriotism and enthusiasm for this land of the free, indicated that there might be chaos, riot revolution and bloodshed, as had been foretold by the political prophets. A prayer was said and Chairman Rosewater called the convention to order. Being innocent of political wisdom I could not now venture to say precisely what happened after that. Governor Hadley of Missouri had climbed over the ropes around the speakers platform and was vociferiously protesting against what was about to happen. Francis J. Heney was preparing a vocal kick, worded after the rough fashion employed by the colonel and delivered in an Abe-Ruef-case manner.
