### UNITARIANS TO SELL CHURCH

Congregation Desires to Secure More Desirable Location.

### PROPERTY IS HELD AT \$15,000

It is felt by Trustees that Church Building at Seventeenth and Cass Could Be Remodeled into Apartments.

Negotiations for the sale of the First Unitarian church, Seventeenth and Cass streets, are now being conducted by the trustees, and it is hoped that the property will be disposed of before the summer is over.

The trustees are holding the church building and lot at \$15,000, and already it has been examined by prospective purchasers. The City Mission is said to be desirous of obtaining the place, and representatives of the organization have looked at the property several times. The mission is one of the Anna Wilson beneficiaries, receiving property to the value of about \$25,000 to be held in trust. Those in charge of the mission, however, are not a unit on the church property, some feeling that the old Omaha Medical college is more desirable.

If the Unitarian church disposes of its holdings this summer it is more than likely that new lot will be secured and a more desirable place for worship be erected within a year. Members of the congregation feel that the church has outgrown its present location. The church and ground are now mortgaged to about 75 per cent of their value.

It is felt by the trustees that they will be able to sell soon, for the property is especially desirable for an apartment house, if the City Mission decides to take it. The building is of heavy masonry, and was built about 1855.

### Colvin Vacancy Filled.

At a meeting of the trustees of the church Miss Margaret E. Colvin was elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mrs. John R. Stevens, formerly Mrs. H. T. Coe.

An informal report was presented by the treasurer, Mr. Grant Parsons, indicating that the financial affairs are in better shape than at the same period of any previous year.

### Ward at County Hospital Tries to Kill Dr. Geo. Tilden

After having threatened to kill Dr. George Tilden of the board of insanity commissioners, Mrs. Sarah O'Donnell, a patient in the insane ward of the county hospital, armed herself with a hat pin and was caught dangerously near the doctor by attendants.

Mrs. O'Donnell, who was committed to the hospital several weeks ago, blames Robinson's daughter, observed her and noted that she held one hand to her bosom, as if concealing something. Miss Robinson caught the woman's hand and discovered a long hatpin concealed under her waist. She sent Mrs. O'Donnell back to her room. Dr. Tilden did not know of his danger until it had passed.

### Withnell Urges an Elevator Tax

C. H. Withnell, commissioner of fire protection and water supply, will submit to the commission a plan to increase the finances of the city \$4,000 annually by the passage of an elevator occupation tax ordinance. This ordinance will fix a tax of \$1 on each of the 314 elevators in the city and will provide for the following installation fees: Twenty passenger elevator, \$5; fifteen-passenger, \$3; less than fifteen passenger, \$2; five-ton freight elevator, \$5; three-ton, \$3; hand hoist and sidewalk, \$2.

"There is now no elevator tax," said Mr. Withnell, "and practically no inspection, although it is required that elevators be inspected quarterly. All the city receives now is \$711 annually, paid for permits and licenses to the 300 elevator conductors."

Mr. Withnell will ask that an inspection of each elevator in the city be made monthly. The occupation tax would merely cover the cost of this inspection to the property owner. It would increase the revenues from elevators to \$4,581 a year, money that is sorely needed by the administration, says Mr. Withnell.

### MAY BUILD INSANE HOSPITAL

Proposal Made to Use Material in Old Court House.

### BOARD IS CONSIDERING PLANS

However, Cost of Wrecking the Old Structure May Be Too Great to Permit Adoption of the Hospital Plan.

A new county hospital for the insane may be built from the wreckage of the Douglas court house after it is abandoned for the new county building, now nearing completion. Commissioner Frank C. Best, chairman of the hospital and poor farm committee, has suggested to the board that the old building might be wrecked and the new material used for a new insane hospital. The board now is considering the feasibility of the plan.

The county hospital and poor farm buildings now are inadequate and board members for several years have agreed that there should be more and better accommodations. The county has two bids for wrecking the building and has been expected to accept \$1,500 from J. P. Milander, who bid to pay this amount for the building and remove it. The commissioners now are negotiating with others. If they can find wreckers who will do the work at cost low enough they will adopt the hospital plan. There is much good building material in the old structure, but it may be that the cost of wrecking will be too great to permit the adoption of the hospital plan.
