Chorists and Leaders to Have Vacations—Henry Cox Will Lead Central Presbyterian Again.

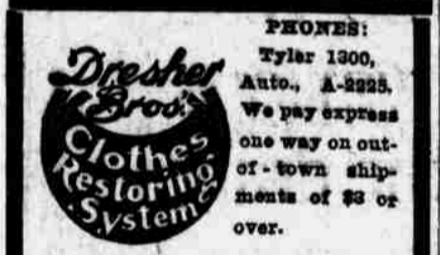
The following program will be given at Lowe Avenue Presbyterian church tomorrow evening.
