LOUIS ANDERSON WRITES OF VOYAGE ON THE FINLAND

Louis Anderson, Nebraska's only representative on the American Olympic team and one of the two Missouri Valley conference school contestants, has written to Omaha friends telling of the voyage across the ocean and of the reception at Antwerp, the point from which he mailed the communication. The trip was a pleasurable one for the whole United States contingent. Few of them were ill, and nearly all of them were in training on the Finland, the big boat on which they sailed, and which was fitted up like a modern gymnasium. A cork track had been provided for the runners, but the young Cornhusker said that three or four trials on this path made his muscles sore, so that he was forced to quit the boat running. Other members of the crew did real well in the training. The Americans were in fine shape when they landed. Anderson wrote. Everywhere the American boys went they were royally treated. The reception which the citizens of Antwerp accorded them was such as to strike delight into every American heart. The boys, the young Cornhusker said, felt they were right at home. The managers of the American team and the athletes all believed that they would receive fair treatment in Stockholm.

WILL HEAVILY POLICE VANDERBILT CUP RACE

MILWAUKEE, Wis., July 6.—In outlining the extensive plans that are being made for the Vanderbilt cup and Grand Prix races, Bart J. Ruddle, manager of the Milwaukee Automobile Dealers' association, in the course of an interview said: "The big problem is the policing of the course. We are figuring on policing the eight-mile course with 300 national guardsmen, about twelve companies. In addition we will have about 400 deputy sheriffs to protect the property of the residents along the course. We will allow about three policemen to each farm. The city of West Allis, adjoining the course on the north, will swear in 100 extra men to co-operate with 200 or 300 men that Milwaukee will be able to spare to protect property in that section. "Every effort is being made to make the course absolutely safe in every respect. In the first place we were very fortunate in securing a course that has no right angles or dangerous spots. All roads will be improved by oiling or resurfacing with gravel wherever necessary. "We are trying to seat 40,000 in our grandstand. Present plans call for two tiers of boxes to seat 1,200 people. These boxes will be sold in two sections, those facing the start and finish—and those on either side. The start and finish boxes will be \$75 for the two races and the other boxes \$50 for both races."
