HENLEY-ON-THAMES, Eng., July 7 .-Henley regatta, England's famous water carnival yesterday reached the culminating point in all the big events, and for the first time since its inception in 1839 received the patronage of the king.

The king, accompanied by the queen and Princess Mary, came from London to Henley by train. On arriving there King George and Queen Mary embarked on the royal barge, which was brilliantly emblazoned with red and gold and manned by the king's watermen in their liveries of centuries ago.
