HALL'S WRIST SLIGHTLY HURT

It was sure an interesting game and the fans were kept at a high pitch of excitement all the time. Two or three times after the fifth inning Lincoln could have won with a timely clout, but at these critical stages Hall was invincible.

A ripping double play in the seventh and another in the ninth kept the 'lopes from being dangerous. In the seventh Berghammer reached first on Justice's error, but Lloyd batted the ball to Schlick, who got Bernie at second and caught Lloyd at first.
