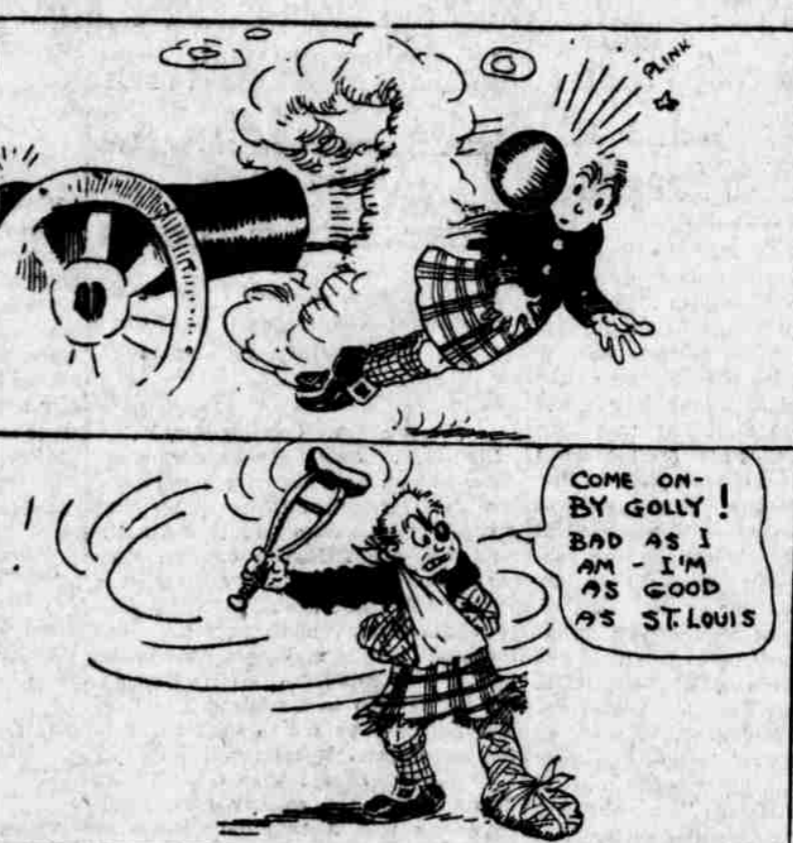
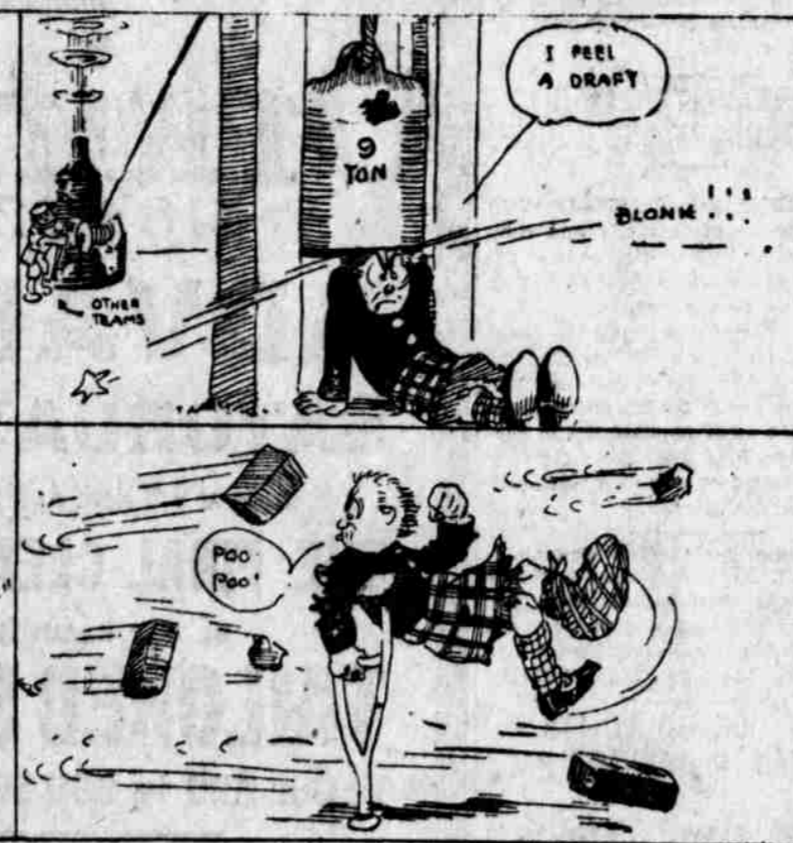

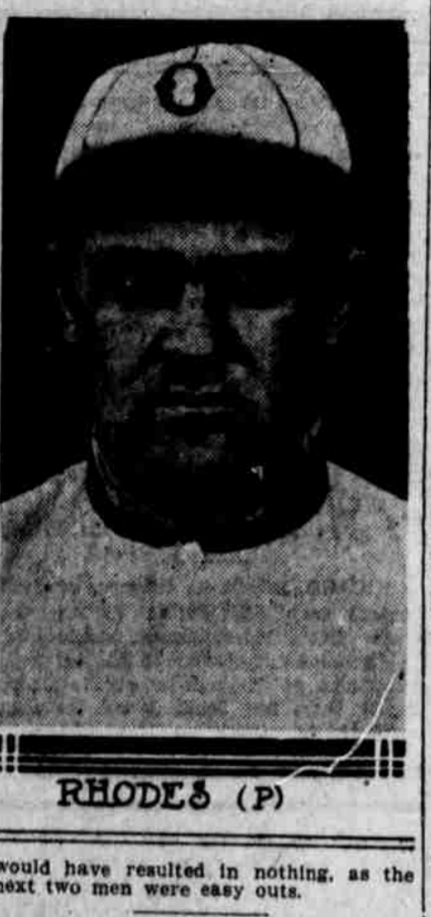
Omaha Hops Onto Gear's Bunch and Wins Easily.
