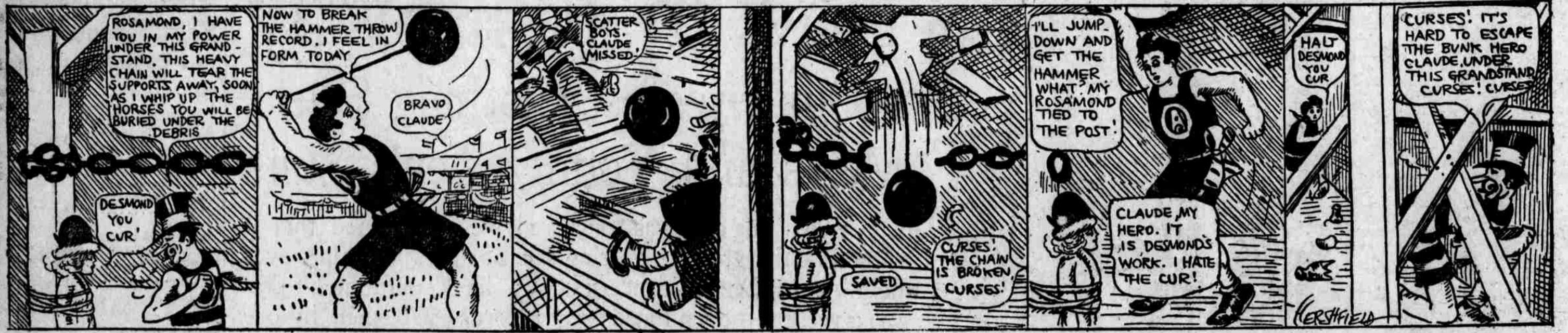


Desperate Desmond
