Henley Regatta Will Be Held at St. Catherine's in August.

REGAN IS SLATED TO WIN

Butler Will Likely Return from Stockholm in Time to Take Part in Big Aquatic Event.

ST. CATHARINES, Ont., July 22.—There is a mighty good chance that the senior singles sculling championship will be wrested from Canada at the Canadian Henley regatta which will be held on the permanent course here on Friday and Saturday, August 2 and 3.

The next senior singles champion will likely be Dave Regan of Buffalo, the stalwart son of Police Superintendent Regan, who last year showed himself to be one of the fastest oarsmen on the continent. In the easiest possible fashion Regan defeated his opponents in the junior and intermediate classes, and was quite ready to go up against Butler, the champion, only he was persuaded otherwise by his friends. Tired out by his two races, the Buffalo lad would have been handicapped by the champion, who had not rowed a race. So Butler last year rowed over the course to protect his championship.

Butler will likely be back from Stockholm in time to go up against Regan. It may be that other aspirants from across the line will arise to question Butler's supremacy, but even with only the two in the race, representing the best in amateur scullers in Canada and the United States, it will be a great race. It is whispered that there may be a Boston element this year, and although likely a couple from New York and Detroit.

Detroit is coming in full strength, and there will be a great many oarsmen here from Toronto and Montreal. Detroit will make another endeavor to take the senior single championship away from the Toronto Argonauts, which the latter so bravely defended last year. The Detroiters laid last year that they would keep right on trying after that championship until they got it. They are great scullers.

Buffalo will have representatives present from its three rowing clubs, and will make a big effort to sweep clean at this year's Canadian Henley. The Buffalonians are good sports, and should they win something good after their many years of trying, their victory would be a popular one. As for several years past, all the races but the single, junior and single, will be rowed with a turn. Preparations for the Canadian Henley are well under way.

TENNIS VETS DRUB YOUTHS

Kennedy and Madden Win at Happy Hollow.

SIXTY GAMES ARE NECESSARY

Happy Hollow Club Arranges to Host Two Hundred Spectators.

In the most exciting match of the Happy Hollow tennis tournament, "Spike" Kennedy and John Madden, Kountze club "vets," barely nosed out a win over Robert McCague and Joe Adams in the semi-final doubles yesterday afternoon. The match went the full five sets and the final tab was 6-8, 6-4, 6-4, 2-6, 10-8, which shows that a total of sixty games was necessary to decide the frames.

From the beginning the match was hard fought. It was a battle of sinewy veterans against agile youngsters, stamina and experience against quickness of eye and youthful vigor. As it happened the "vets" won out in the end and thereby placed the Kountze club in line for a prominent place on the local tennis map.

Whenever McCague and Adams resorted to lobbing, Kennedy and Madden played a careful back court game and contented themselves with flopping slow, waverin' "dope" balls over the net. McCague's serve proved a puzzle in the first and fourth sets and when he got to swishing the rubber over the mesh with a corkscrew twist the "vets" were at loss to return without slaming into net or missing entirely.

Veterans Win.

With two sets each, Adams and McCague ran the fifth and deciding frame up to 6-2 in their favor. Then the eighth game went to deuce and the youngsters took the "ad." With the match point hovering about Adams slammed into net and brought the game back to deuce. Twice more the lads pulled up to match point only to lose the advantage. With the critical stage over, Kennedy and Madden made the best of their opportunity and came up from behind with clockwork precision. Finally the score reached 3 all and by dint of some snappy service and Madden's ability to hang a couple of net "canopies" at the right time, the "vets" won the next two games and incidentally the set, 10-8. The match lasted exactly two hours and twenty-five minutes.

Room for Gallery.

Arrangements will be made by the tennis committee at the Hollow club to accommodate 200 spectators when the championship matches are played off this afternoon. The banks along the sides of the courts will also be open to onlookers.

As no consolation play was arranged,

this afternoon will mark the close of the tournament.

CALIFORNIANS IN THE FINALS

Western Tennis Players Show Ability at Lake Forest.

NUMEROUS BRILLIANT MATCHES

Final Match in Women's Singles Will Bring Together Miss Mary Sutton and Miss Mary Browne.

LAKE FOREST, Ill., July 27.—As a result of today's semi-final matches in the western tennis championship at Onwentsia, California had the majority of finalists, the Golden state being represented in all except one event.

Chicago's only hope in the men's singles is Walter T. Hayes, who will meet T. C. Bundy of Los Angeles in the morning in the one remaining semi-final contest.

Alex Squair and A. L. Green, Jr., the Chicago university cracker will oppose Hayes, and J. H. Winston of Norfolk, Va.

The final match in the women's singles will bring together the premier player of the Pacific coast, Miss Mary Sutton and Miss Mary K. Browne of Los Angeles. The winner will be western champion, and Mrs. George H. Wightman (Hazel Hotchkiss) will not appear to defend her title in the women's doubles, Miss Sutton and Miss Carrie B. Neely of Chicago will meet Miss Browne and Mrs. F. H. Seymour of Nashville, Tenn. stars in final form.

The day's play was replete with brilliant matches, contestants in all events being stars of the first magnitude. The first contest of the afternoon was that between Hayes and Byford. Although Hayes had two victories over the former city champion to his credit, Byford fought gamely and took the first set, 6-4. Hayes then braced and won the next two sets, 6-2, 6-2. Byford appeared to weaken after the first frame, while the state titleholder became stronger and the match progressed.

Inman won a notable victory when he eliminated E. H. Braley of Los Angeles. The big Californian, who despite his weight, covers the court with the agility of a panther, forced the New Yorker to extend himself to the limit, even though he succumbed in straight sets, 6-2, 10-8, 6-4. This was the feature match of the afternoon.

Of almost equal interest was the combat between Church and Mac, the Princetonian star, and Hayes and Winston. The latter duo took the first set, 7-5, after the hardest kind of a fight. The far-reaching Hayes and his elaborate partner were all over the court, the Tigers finding it difficult to keep the ball out of range of their opponents, and at the same time within bounds. The Princetonians led in the second set, 5-2, but Hayes and Winston steadied and took the next five games and the set, 7-4.

This rally seemed to discourage the Tigers and they allowed their opponents to take the deciding set, 6-1. Squair and Green had an easy time beating Rockwell and Washburn, another local pair, in straight sets, 6-0, 6-2, 6-1.

Women in Close Matches.

The women's events brought forth stellar play, although the results from a local standpoint were disappointing. Miss Sutton disposed of Miss Steever with surprising ease, 6-0, 6-1, and Miss Browne eliminated Miss Nealey, 6-1, 6-3.

Miss Sutton and Miss Nealey easily defeated Mrs. Monroe and Miss Murphy of New Orleans, 6-1, 6-0, the southern stars being outclassed. The contest between Miss Browne and Mrs. Seymour of Nashville and Miss Hoyt and Miss Steever was stubbornly fought, the former pair beating the local stars, 6-1, 6-4.

Miss Browne's superior playing was the feature, the brilliant work of the Los Angeles girl turning the tide of battle. Maurice McLaughlin arrived during the morning to defend his title. He and T. C. Bundy opposed C. B. Hard and Harry Waldner in an exhibition match during the afternoon. The California stars won three sets, 7-5, 6-1, 6-4, the match attracting a large gallery. Summaries:
