



No More Base Ball Thefts. No More Base Ball Thefts.

In pursuance of an order from President Johnson there has been a change in the system which supplied the umpires with balls during a game. The boy with the bag has been eliminated, and, instead, a box is imbedded in the ground behind the plate, from which the umpire takes balls as he needs them. This prevents the manipulating of the balls during a game by the home team.
