Robinson has a lot of ginger up to do to get down to real business.

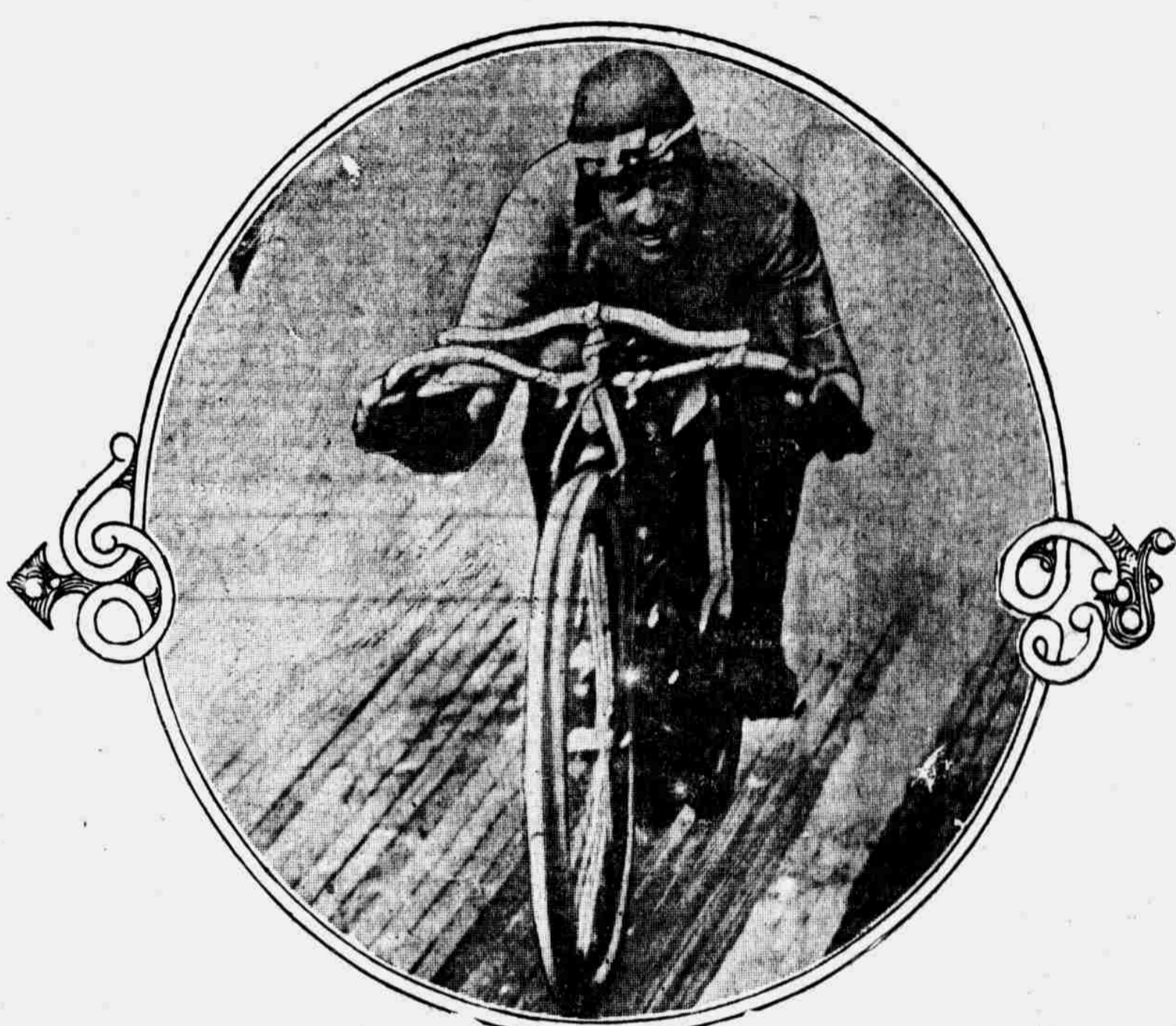
Kenworthy is the most valuable ball player Denver has had for many a year.

Wendell Hussey, the 15-year-old Shendoah lad who won the 1912 singles championship of southwestern Iowa, and Frank Morgan of Wayne, Neb., have both written that they will take part.

Berrion Hughes, Denver; Al Dickinson, Wichita; Joe Armstrong, St. Paul; Olin Sweet and Fred Bradley of Des Moines, and Ray Branson, Mitchell, S. D., are also coming.

By a ruling of the Field club tennis committee all matches will be two out of three advantage sets, excepting the semi-final, final and challenge rounds, which will be three out of five sets.
