OMAHA PULLS OUT ONE SCORE

Denver Comes Here and Takes the First of the Series.

MANAGES TO LAND EIGHT RUNS

Infield Makes a Bunch of Errors and Then the Visitors Land on Pitchers Foutain and Beebe.

Omaha's infield played the worst kind of base ball yesterday and made five errors, while Denver landed hard on Fugate in the first inning, driving him from the box and then jumped on Beebe, winning the first game of the series, 8 to 1.

Healey, working on the mound for the Grizzlies, was in great form and never in danger. His "spitters" were jumping all over the bag and nine of the Rourke batters went the strikeout route while breaking their backs to connect safely. The big Denver hurler only gave out six hits.

Beebe started it in the first inning by making a poor throw to the plate of Quinn's easy grounder, allowing Beal to score after he had hammered out a three-bagger. Here Fugate was benched and Beebe brought to the rescue. The fair haired lad pitched good ball, but was a trifle wild, but even at that, Denver would not have made but one or two runs off him, but for errors.

The Grizzlies, on the other hand, played peevish winning ball. The infield took hard chances and got away with them. Quinn played a great game at third and his wonderful fielding at times kept the Rourkes from scoring.
