Packers, speculators and shippers were all engaged in the the early trade and paid prices mostly 5c higher for good hogs, speculators in some cases paying as much as 10c higher than yesterday's market. More hogs were secured for speculative purposes than for several for speculative purposes than for several days back. Most of the mixed and packing grades were picked up at prices a nickel higher, though quite a few sold at steady figures. As on yesterday old heavy sows were hard to sell and were entirely neglected by buyers until almost everything else had been disposed of. Trade showed considerable life during the first hours, becoming somewhat slow at the close. With about sixty-three loads, or 4,247 head, being reported on the market almost everything had changed hands by 11 o'clock. A couple of loads of good light hogs made a top at \$8.46, a nickel higher than the highest price yesterday. This is the highest price paid for a full load of hogs since Saturday, when \$8.45

In addition to today's recelpts there were about eighteen loads that were held over from yesterday. The apparent duliness of the early might be attributed to the fact that packers bought a large proportion of the lib-eral supply this week.
