Mrs. Costa is alleged to have left home with her son and companion some four months ago. Her husband immediately instituted a search for the woman in an effort to regain his son. Mrs. Costa is also said to have had \$500 to her credit in an Ohio bank. Paul Popa who was living with the woman was turned loose by the police because of lack of incriminating evidence. The woman was charged with adultery.

Lincoln Man Drowns in View of Hundreds; None Sees Him Sink

LINCOLN, Aug. 26.—E. R. Dunham, a well known Lincoln business man, was drowned in the Capital beach swimming pool here at noon today. No one saw him go under and he was not missed until his wife began to hunt for him. The pool was dragged and the body located at 2:15 p. m., after it had been under water more than two hours.

The drowning took place in the presence of hundreds of people but no one saw him sink. Cramps is believed to have been the cause.

Dunham was 55 years of age and owned considerable property in Lincoln and elsewhere in the state.

DETROIT, Mich., Aug. 26.—George Morrison, T. Edward Jolly and Louis Loosa were drowned in the Detroit river today, after their overloaded canoe sank. They had been paddling about at the head of Belle Isle when the craft took in water and hurled the young men into the river.

Henry Steinberg, who was also in the boat clinging to the canoe for nearly two hours before being sighted by a passing launch.

Bryan Arranges Own Tour. Mr. Bryan has arranged his own itinerary to begin about September 1. He will speak for the most part in the middle west, beginning, it is said, in Nebraska, and taking in Wisconsin, Minnesota, North and South Dakota, Montana, Washington, Oregon, Utah, Missouri, Illinois and Ohio. In these Mr. Bryan will make big stumping tours, but he also will devote as much time as possible to states east of the Mississippi river.

While Mr. Bryan is concentrating on the northwest and the middle west, Speaker Clark will tour the southwest. After his three speeches in Maine next week, he will proceed to Missouri, Colorado, New Mexico and California.

Representative Underwood will speak for the most part in the east, and probably will discuss chiefly the tariff.

Governor Harmon of Ohio will speak in the middle west and Governor Foss of Massachusetts, who is campaigning in Vermont now for the national ticket, will fill a number of engagements outside of New England as well, according to present plans.

Key to the Situation—Bee Advertising.

Yuan and Dr. Sun in Perfect Agreement

PEKING, Aug. 26.—President Yuan Shi Kai and Dr. Sun Yat Sen, former provisional president of China, dined together last evening and later held a conference lasting several hours during which the political situation was thoroughly discussed.

At the conclusion of the conference they gave out a statement saying that they were in perfect accord on all important questions. Dr. Sun Yat Sen said he believed the execution of General Chang Chen Wu, who was put to death for his alleged implication in a revolutionary plot at Hankow, would not lead to trouble and that the north and the south would work together harmoniously in the future.

Dr. Sun considers that Yuan Shi Kai is eminently fitted for the presidency. On leaving the palace he said: "Yuan is a great man and is worthy of support." A chairman of the north are showing Dr. Sun Yat Sen many attentions during his stay here.

A considerable part of Tung-Chow, located twelve miles from Peking, was looted and burned today by great numbers of discontented "old style" Chinese troops, who suddenly appeared in the streets bent on pillage and bloodshed. Twelve persons were slain and part of the town was practically destroyed.

Six Are Killed in Electrical Storms

DESOTO, Mo., Aug. 26.—Four members of the family of Jefferson Rubio, a road worker, were killed by lightning, which struck the tent in which they were living here today. Rubio, his wife, a 16-year-old daughter and a baby girl were instantly killed. A grown son escaped death, but was stunned and severely burned.

The family was living in a tent about four miles southeast of here. The storm came up without warning and is said to have been the most severe ever experienced in this section. Several houses in this city were struck, but no one was either killed or injured.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 26.—Two were killed and several persons injured when an electrical storm passed over this city and vicinity early today. In St. Louis considerable property was destroyed. On the east side the storm is reported to have been the most severe.

No Campaign Trip in President's Plans

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 26.—President Taft's plans for leaving Washington were as indefinite tonight as those of congress for adjournment. With the general deficiency bill still pending in both houses, it is impossible for him to get away, although his friends know the president is anxious to go north and enjoy the rest and seclusion of Beverly for a few weeks.

The president did not get to bed in the White House until early today and consequently missed his usual Sunday morning church service. He remained in the White House until late this afternoon and then took a long motor ride about Washington's suburbs. His only caller during the day was Senator Crane of Massachusetts.

The president told friends who talked with him early today that he expected to keep only a few important engagements after leaving Washington. He made it clear that he does not intend to enter into a stump campaign of any sort. He believed he has been misunderstood and that the impression has gained credence that he will make several political speeches before the election. His friends were told that he would do practically no talking on political subjects unless republican organizations visit him at Beverly or unless any of his engagements are turned into political gatherings.
