# BIG YIELDS OF WHEAT IN HARLAN COUNTY

REPUBLICAN CITY, Neb., Sept. (Special.)-About 50 per cent of the acres yielding fifty-one bushels per acre and the balance of 110 acres which he had in averaged twenty-seven bushels per acre, testing sixty-four pounds and only one bushel per acre used for seed. Dean Drummond sowed thirty acres for pasture last fall, putting two bushels stock off of it the middle of May. He threshed out forty-four bushels an acre.
