First Big Run of Spring Wheat Will Go to Millers.

WEATHER FAVORABLE TO CORN Overabundance of Oats in This Country Will in Time Prove a

Great Weight on the

Trade.

OMAHA, Sept. 5.—There are indications that the first be run of spring whaet will be taken care of by millers and exporters and will disappear very much the same as the early heavy run of winter wheat did two months ago. With all the heavy run to Minneapolls of late, no accumulation of stocks are showing up there as yet. The very bad weather on the other side of the ocean, it is argued, will continue a very liberal demand of dry wheat from this side. The shipping sales of wheat in Chicago yesterday were raised to 240,000 bushels of No. 2 hard wheat, with 400,000 bushels sold at the seaboard. The firmness in the market appears to be something a little more than the tembe something a little more than the temporary recovery from the oversold condition of previous days. Regardless of these bullish features, there is a wide-spread bearish feeling in the trade because of the large wheat production everywhere for the year. Cash wheat unchanged to 1/20 lower.

The weather over the corn belt is favorable and if the market situation was a normal one it would be decidedly bearish, but those who are short large quantities of corn for the new crop months are alarmed over the persistent

quantities of corn for the new crop months are alarmed over the persistent accumulation of the options, especially for December, by strong Chicago interests. They are also forced to hedge on hard spots, because there is such a wide difference between the new crop months and the September option. These are the conditions on which traders advise the buying side of December corn of late and the situation is little changed.
