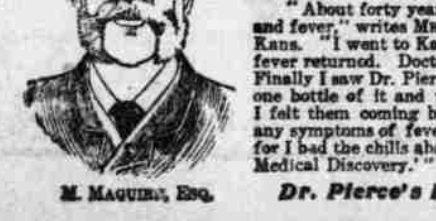

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CORN IS UP ONE PER CENT

Condition of Crop September 1 is Above Ten-Year Average.

YIELD OF SPRING WHEAT LARGE

Indications that it will be Six Bushels an Acre Greater Than Last Year—Oats Crop Is Above the Normal.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—The September crop report of the United States Department of Agriculture, issued at 2:15 p. m. today and compiled by the crop reporting board from reports of correspondents and agents of the bureau of statistics, gives a summary of the condition on September 1, or at time of harvest, of corn, spring wheat, oats, barley, buckwheat, potatoes, tobacco, flaxseed, rice and apples, and a preliminary estimate of the yield and quality of hay.

Corn—Condition, 82.1 per cent of a normal, compared with 80 per cent August 1, 70.3 per cent on September 1 last year and 81.1 per cent the average condition of September 1 for the last ten years. The indicated yield per acre, estimated from condition reports, is 27.2 bushels, compared with 22.9 bushels harvested last year and 27.1 bushels the average yield for 1906-10. On the planted area, 168,110,000 acres, it is estimated the final total production will be about 2,866,000,000 bushels, compared with 2,531,000,000 bushels harvested last year and 2,886,000 bushels harvested in 1910.

Spring Wheat—Condition, 90.3 per cent of a normal at time of harvest, compared with 90.4 per cent on August 1, 86.7 per cent at time of harvest last year and 76.5 per cent, the average condition at time of harvest for the last ten years. The indicated yield per acre, estimated from condition reports, is 15.5 bushels, compared with 14 bushels harvested last year and 13.4 bushels, the average yield, 1906-10. On the planted area, 15,301,000 acres, it is estimated the final total production will be about 240,000,000 bushels, compared with 201,000,000 bushels harvested last year and 201,000,000 bushels harvested in 1910.

Oats Crop Is Large

Oats—Condition, 92.3 per cent of a normal at time of harvest, compared with 90.3 per cent on August 1, 84.5 per cent at time of harvest last year and 78.3 per cent, the average condition at time of harvest for the last ten years. The indicated yield per acre, estimated from condition reports, is 41.1 bushels, compared with 34 bushels harvested last year, and 34 bushels, the average yield, 1906-10. On the planted area, 37,440,000 acres, it is estimated the final total production will be about 1,539,000,000 bushels, compared with 1,220,000,000 bushels harvested last year, and 1,186,000,000 bushels harvested in 1910.

Sand Hill Corn is Up to the Average

"A month ago we were looking for a bumper corn crop in Custer county," said R. S. Harrington, a farmer living near Broken Bow and stopping at the Merchants, "but we are not going to get it. However, the crop on the whole will be fully up to the average."

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—Normal temperatures for the season is predicted by the weather bureau for the coming week in the lake region, the great central valley, the plains states and the Rocky mountain and plateau regions. Though the weather will be generally fair, fairly well distributed showers are probable in the northern and eastern states.

SIX DEAD AT MOTOR RACE

'Cycle Ridden by World's Champion Plunges Into Crowd.

HALF DOZEN OTHERS MAY DIE

Denver Motorcyclist Riding in Contest Thrown Into Track Enclosure When Struck by Champion's Wheel.

NEWARK, N. J., Sept. 9.—Eddie Hasha of Waco, Tex., holder of several world records for motorcycle racing, plunged over the rail of the course at the new Newark motorrome into a crowd late yesterday, causing the death of six persons, including himself, while six are dying and thirteen are badly injured. The only two of the six dead positively identified up to a late hour tonight were Hasha and Johnny Albright, a Denver motorcyclist, who was riding third in the race. The other four dead were boys and young men among the spectators.

New Battleship to Equal in Size That Ordered by England

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—The new battleship, Pennsylvania, the only one authorized by congress at the last session, will be fully as large as the great battleship which the British government has just ordered, according to plans of the naval general board. Its displacement will exceed 30,000 tons, which is about equal to the addition of a good sized cruiser's displacement to the biggest ship the United States now has afloat.

Rival Dies in Hospital

Albright was thrown head-first in the other direction into the enclosure of the track, when the champion's wheel cascading down the steep bank and struck him. He was picked up for dead, but he lived in an unconscious state for more than two hours after removal to a hospital. He finally succumbed to hemorrhages of the lungs.

Six Start in Race

Six riders started in the free-for-all race, which was the last event on the program. It was a handicap event with Hasha and Ray Seymour of Los Angeles, an old rival for premier track honor, each starting from scratch. Ray Peck, another Los Angeles rider, started at the quarter-mile mark, and Albright, the Denver rider, and Frank King and John King of Newark were each given two full laps handicap. The track is a quarter-mile and circular.

Culls from the Wire

Hasha, the dead champion, sprang into fame as a motorcyclist at Los Angeles last February, when he was given credit for new records in the one, two, three and four-mile events. On the Newark track last month he bettered the mile record again, traveling the distance in 3 1/2 seconds.

Senator Cummins Will Go to Europe

DES MOINES, Ia., Sept. 9.—Senator Cummins soon will start for Europe, where he will remain until shortly before the November elections, according to an announcement made tonight. The trip abroad will be in connection with a report to be made next winter by a senate committee, the exact nature of which has not been made public. Mr. Cummins will accompany this senator.

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Crowds of Veterans Attend Churches at Patriotic Services

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Sept. 9.—The crowds that have been pouring into Los Angeles for the forty-sixth annual encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic were augmented today by the arrival of a dozen special trains from the east, middle west and Rocky mountain states. The registration was much heavier than anticipated.
