Covering of Short Lines of Wheat Amounts to Millions.

CORN IS RAPIDLY MATURING

Oats Market Has Been Stretched by Belief that Shipping Sales Have Reached the Limit of Railroad Capacity.

It was conceded by leaders in the Chicago wheat trade that the covering of short lines on the rebound in the market from \$3.40 to \$3.50 amounted to several million bushels. This buying was the chief cause for the recovery in prices yesterday.

Most of the reports coming in from the big surplus corn states create the impression that the crop of the year will be from four to six weeks of fine weather is still needed to finish the crop.

The cash market on wheat has been stretched by the belief that the shipping and export sales have already been reduced to the limit of railroad capacity.

Weakness of corn, though having no influence for a long time, turned out in the end a material factor in depressing prices.
