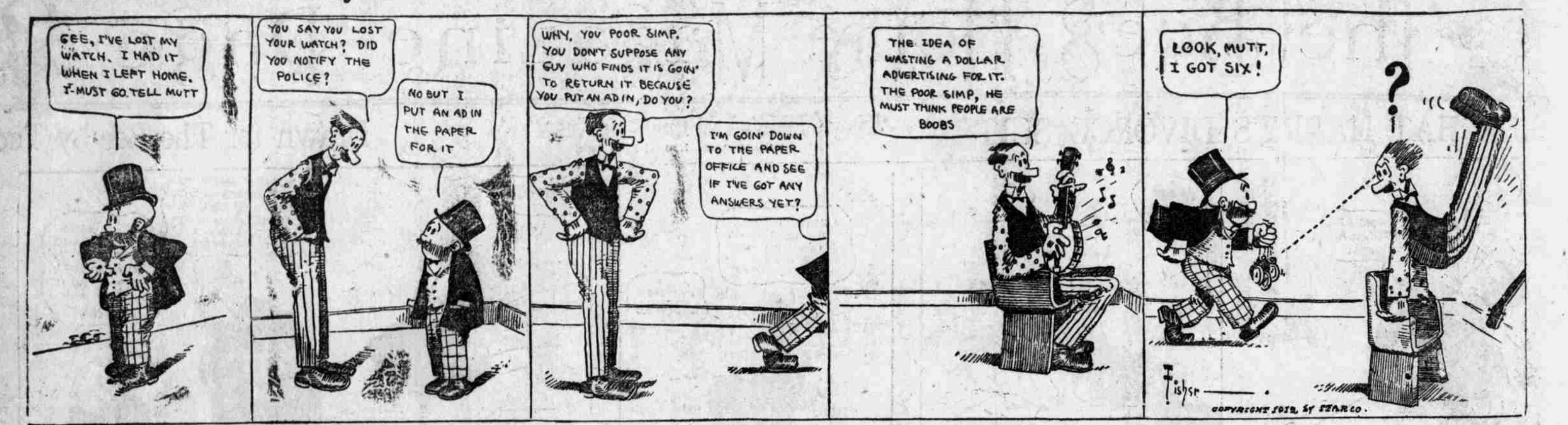

Culls from the Wire

Pressmen and feeders in twenty-three shops struck in Portland, Ore., for an advance in wages and several changes in shop rules. Governor Johnson spoke in more than a dozen Iowa cities yesterday. Governor Johnson took his private car for Burlington, where he will spend Sunday. Word was received in Chicago of the murder of Joseph E. Rickerdick, formerly a wealthy resident of that city, at San Andreas, Lower California, by Juan Rees, a guide, June 13. Burton W. Gibson, the accused lawyer, declared in his cell in the Jackson, N. Y. jail that he was preparing a defense which would clear him instantly of the charge that he murdered his client, Ross Macdonald. The department of agriculture received a report showing that 15,000 to 20,000 acres of cotton in Arkansas have been damaged by the cotton caterpillar. The railway cost of the ravages of the pest was not estimated. The British minister to China, Sir John N. Jordan, made the representation to the Chinese government that Great Britain does not view with favor the new loan of \$30,000,000 negotiated in London by the Chinese minister and a representative of an independent bank. The temporary injunction issued by United States District Judge Cushman restraining fifty-one residents of Renton, a coal mining town near Seattle, from interfering with non-union men employed in the mine of the Puget Sound Traction, Light and Power company, was made permanent. Fierce Fight Waged at Foot Ball Game By Irish Factions

BELFAST, Ireland, Sept. 15.-A fierce fight was waged in Celtic park foot ball grounds today in which sixty persons were severely injured. Two of them being in a critical condition. Five of the injured are suffering from shot wounds. The fight took place at half time in a game in the league series between Belfast Celtic team and a team representing Linfield. The Linfields were leading by a score of 1 to 0. Some Celtic supporters unfurled a green and white flag and started to parade. Linfield partisans displayed a union jack. Immediately stones, bricks and clinkers were hurled through the air. The police were powerless. The opposing mobs, thousands strong, surged toward the playing field, where a regular battle was fought in full view of the spectators in the grandstand. The report of a revolver caused a lull and many left the grounds, but the stone throwing was soon resumed both inside and outside the grounds. More revolver shots were fired, but police reinforcements arrived and suppressed the mob. Ambulances were summoned and started to remove the wounded lying on the field, some of whom were in a shocking state, covered with blood. Altogether twenty-five persons were taken to the hospital.

OLDFIELD AGAIN HOLDS MILE AUTOMOBILE RECORD

CLEVELAND, O., Sept. 15.-Three times today at North Randall, near here, was the automobile record for a mile on a circular dirt track broken. The old record holder, Barney Oldfield, himself smashed the mark first, lowering it from 1:34 to 49.3 seconds. Louis Disbrow did not suffer Oldfield to enjoy his new laurels long, for soon after Oldfield's performance, Disbrow sent his car whirling around the course in 49.3 seconds. Then Oldfield went out to beat Disbrow's new mark, which he did by another wide margin in 47.9 seconds.

Street Car Service Resumed in Duluth

DULUTH, Minn., Sept. 15.-Street railway service was resumed here today, at least 75 per cent of the cars being manned by strike breakers. Not a brick was thrown. Governor Eberhart came today and listened to statements from both sides. He told the sheriff to stop the rioting or he would order out the state militia, but declared his confidence in the sheriff's ability to cope with the situation.
