FRIENDS ARE ON QUI VIVE Michele Popp, Formerly Tailor of Magic City, Returns in Four Years with Nice Load of Cattle for Sale.

That John M. Tanner, democratic candidate for the state senate, has lost much of his political prestige, appears from the alignment with John Gillin, the local democratic bosslet. The closeness of the two politicians was made public in what is reckoned as an affront to the city council, which recently instructed City Clerk Wheeler to cut the report of the city treasurer from an extended manuscript to such proportions as would afford their body a proper conception of the present state of the city's finances. Notwithstanding the orders of the council the report as compiled and composed by the Gillin cabinet will be run in Tanner's paper, it is said. Gillin, it is also said, will have to pay nothing for the privilege and publicity, although the city will pay many dollars for a smaller copy of the report.
